### To Build Concrete Laundry.

The Sisters of St. Francis have taken out a permit to build a concrete laundry building back of their academy, to cost about \$7500. The building will be 22 feet by 44 in dimensions.

### BLAKE ISSUES ULTIMATUM TO AMERICAN HOSPITAL.

PARIS, Sept. 29.—Disgusted with the manner in which the American Ambulance Hospital in Paris has been run, Dr. Joseph A. Blake, the noted American surgeon has issued an ultimatum naming the terms on which he will remain with the institution. He resigned the other day, but friends are trying to influence him to reconsider his resignation.

Dr. Blake demands the removal of Dr. Doubochet and the installation of himself as surgeon-in-chief. He also wants to do away with the white uniform members of the American social colony who have been acting as officers of the day, coming and going when they please and smoke cigarettes in the corridors.

Dr. Blake has announced his intention of joining the British hospital and continuing his work there. Quite a number of the men under Dr. Blake have signified their intention of going with him.
