Atlantic Coast Attacked.
WASHINGTON, Oct. 1.—A heavy line of Greatdoughts and an auxiliary fleet of transport-ships at sunrise today attacked the Atlantic coast from Norfolk to Cape Cod.

A move will be started in that county, no doubt for tick eradication. The residents simply can't afford to have the Jack rabbit crop decreased. Since there is much complaint from surrounding counties against depredations of Jack rabbits on all kinds of crops, it is believed an effort will be made to obtain a supply of Coke county's rabbit ticks for distribution among the less desirable cottontails.
