### FARMERS REJOICE AS CUSHER IS DEDICATED

LEXINGTON, Ore., Oct. 4.—Morrow county farm land jumped \$100 an acre when 300 farmers, their wives and children, traveled across country for a radius of from 40 to 60 miles to help celebrate the dedication of an artesian water gusher on the farm of B. B. Rice, 16 miles from Lexington, Ore.  
 Ten years ago Rice, aged 28, came to Morrow county from Missouri, took up a quarter section of homestead land. Four years later he purchased an adjoining section from the government at \$125 an acre, and since then has purchased 854 acres at \$10 an acre. Two weeks ago he was offered \$15 an acre for his property, but he wouldn't sell his 1174 acres for \$175 an acre, because water was struck at a depth of 600 feet September 24.

### DALE TRIAL BEGINS

 He was taken to Pilot Rock and later died in the cabin. The posse went over the divide to the Dale cabin and surrounded it. Sheriff Taylor arrived on the scene about 11 o'clock, entered the cabin and found Dale in bed, still partially intoxicated. A rifle was at the head of the bed but no resistance was offered.  
 District Attorney Stelwer stated that the defendant had been in Pendleton for several days prior to the crime, had sold a horse here, spent his money and left for home in an unhappy frame of mind. He stopped at Pilot Rock, secured some whiskey, and, while riding out to the Lon Knotts place in an auto, traded the whiskey with a man named McFarland for a bottle of alcohol. At the Knotts place he borrowed a horse to ride on home, he said. The revolver, which he said would be identified as Dale's, was found near the Ogilvy place by the posse and in the cylinder were two empty shells in one place and a third one in another. The other chambers contained loaded cartridges, he said. Testimony would show that Dale fired one shot at the Knotts place to "tear his nerves."  
 Mr. Peterson declared that the defendant not only had no remembrance of the shooting but had no motive for killing the old people and would never believe that he did it. He had been on a drunken debauch in Pendleton, he said, and was intoxicated on the night of the crime.

ST. PAUL, Oct. 4.—Pess F. Luse, president of the Luse Land company of Sutherland, Ore., capitalist, will not have to pay \$75,000 alimony to his divorced wife, Mrs. Ida M. Wilhelm, under an agreement made when a divorce was granted him in 1907, because Mrs. Wilhelm, in violation of an oral provision of the agreement, became the wife of a Cashmere, Wn., fruitgrower.
