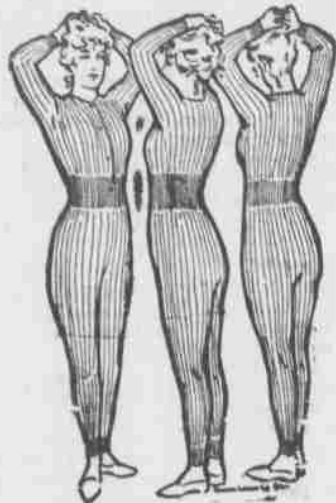

NOTED PYTHIAN ENDS LIFE; ILL HEALTH IS GIVEN AS THE CAUSE

L. R. STINSON, GRAND KEEPER
OF RECORDS AND SEAL,
IS SUICIDE.

Mind Declared Unbalanced Through
Overwork Which Resulted in His
Breakdown—Son Heirs Shot and
Finds Parent Dead by Bedside—
Was Well Known in the State.

SALEM, Ore., Oct. 6.—L. R. Stinson, for 18 years grand keeper of records and seal of the Knights of Pythias for Oregon, committed suicide late yesterday at his farm in Polk county, just across the Willamette river from Salem. He shot himself through the heart with a 12-gauge shotgun. Overwork, resulting in nervous prostration about a month ago, is said by members of the family and friends to have affected Mr. Stinson's mind. They declare he was not mentally responsible for his act. He was 52 years old.

The suicide took place shortly after 5 o'clock in Mr. Stinson's bedroom at his home. A son, Logan Stinson, and his mother, Mrs. A. L. Stinson, were in the house at the time of the shooting. Hearing a

shot they rushed into the bedroom, where they found Mr. Stinson lying at the side of the bed. The shotgun he had used lay at his side. Death was instantaneous.

No Inquest to Be Held.

According to Logan Stinson, his father had seated himself on the bed, placed the muzzle of the shotgun in his breast and pulled the trigger. The authorities were at once notified and Mr. Stinson's body brought to Salem. No inquest will be held.

Mr. Stinson was a native of Oregon, having been born in Albany January 2, 1862. When a year old his parents moved to Salem, where he had resided since. He was a printer by trade, and prior to his election as keeper of records and seal for the grand lodge of the Knights of Pythias, conducted a printing shop here. When the late Frank W. Benson was secretary of state (1897-1911) Mr. Stinson was expert printer with the state printing department.

Fraternity Office Held 18 Years.

For 18 successive years Mr. Stinson was unanimously elected grand keeper of records and seal for the Knights of Pythias. He was regarded by members of the grand lodge and through the nature of his work had a wide acquaintance throughout the state. He was a member of Central Lodge No. 18, Knights of Pythias, this city.

Besides his mother and son, Logan, a widow and a daughter, Mrs. Carl Williams, all of Salem, survive him.

Bulgaria Forced to Mobilize.

LONDON, Oct. 6.—The obstinate refusal of Serbia and Greece to recognize Bulgaria's rights in Macedonia, is forcing mobilization that has brought Bulgaria to the brink of war. Premier Radoslavoff declared in a statement telegraphed to the United Press. Radoslavoff insisted that Bulgaria's mobilization has no aggressive character and that it was taken with the sole object of assuring a realization of Bulgaria's legitimate claims and a resolution to defend by force of arms what he claimed, were Bulgarian rights.

Daughters of Confederacy Meet.

WARRENSBURG, Mo., Oct. 5.—The annual three-day convention of Missouri Division, United Daughters of the Confederacy began here today, with two presidential tickets in the field. Mrs. Thomas Wood Parry of Kansas City and Mrs. Charles Breckenridge Parry of Jefferson City, wife of a supreme court justice are rival candidates.

French Take Trench.

BERLIN, Oct. 6.—Though the French admittedly captured a German trench on the hill northwest of Giverny, other attacks were repulsed, official statement announced. The Germans gained from the British near a point north of Loos and from the French west of Vimy. German aviators bombarded "with visible results," Chalons, where the French rear guard is assembled.

HOG AND DAIRY SHOW WILL BE HELD NOV. 5 AND 6 AT HERMISTON

ANNUAL EXHIBIT AT PROJECT TOWN WILL BE BIGGER EVENT THIS YEAR.

E. P. Dodd Extends Invitation to Pendleton to Attend—Delegation Last Year Was Large One—Feature this Year Will Be An Auction of Registered Hogs.

The annual Hermiston Hog and Dairy Show on Nov. 5 and 6, will be a much bigger and better event this year than last, according to E. P. Dodd who came up last evening with other Hermistonians and visited the Commercial Club. He extended an invitation to Pendletonians to attend, declaring that fully 500 Hermistonians were here for the Round-up. The west end metropolis was pleased with the delegation from Pendleton last year, he said, and hoped to see as large a one down for the show next month.

A feature of the show this year Mr. Dodd said, would be an auction of registered hogs in order to encourage the breeding of good stuff.

Muffins

When muffins are on the breakfast table, nobody cares for meat or eggs and they would be served more often if this meal were not prepared so hurriedly that there is no time to make them. If K. C. the double-raised baking powder is used, the batter may be stirred up the night before, put in the pan ready for baking and nothing to do in the morning but bake them.

One-Egg Muffins

2 cups flour; 2 slightly rounded teaspoonfuls K. C. Baking Powder; 1 teaspoonful salt; 1/2 cup sugar; 1/2 cup melted butter or lard; 1 egg; 1 cup water or milk.

Sift dry ingredients together three times. Add to this the unbeaten egg, melted shortening and water or milk. Then beat all together until perfectly smooth. Oil muffin or gem pans and have oven slow until the muffins come to the top of the pan, then increase the heat to bake and brown the muffins. This recipe makes 12 large muffins. Raisins or currants may be added if desired.

Graham Muffins
