Stories From the War Zone

LONDON, Sept. 22.—(By Mail.)—If

the English supply of tobacco and

pipes only holds out, there can be

no question as to the final favorable

outcome for the allies. This, at least,

is Tommy Atkins' opinion.

"It takes heroes to win a battle

and the thing most necessary to make

Tommy a hero is a faithful pipe that

will stand by him in any emergency."

Recently he has cited concrete ex-

amples to prove this thesis and per-

suade the British public to contrib-

ute more liberally towards the tobacco

pouch in France and the Dardanelles.

There was Lieutenant W. Forshaw,

won the Victoria Cross at Gallipoli.

Four hours, using his pipe and cigar-

ettes for lighting fuses. Tommy in-

sists he could have used his cigar-

ette lighter just as effectively, but

that without smoking he could not

have withstood the strain.

There was E. Berry, sapper of the

First London Field company. He

found a parapet too high, for his

machine gun. So he lighted his pipe,

climbed the parapet, and pulling the

gun up after him continued in ac-

tion. He got the distinguished con-

duct medal for it. But Tommy in-

sists that the encouragement of the

pipe did it.

Only a soldier at the front, Tommy

insists knows the real value of a

smoke. To illustrate, he declares

there was a Tommy, who during the

retreat from Mons was lucky enough

to find a horse. He kept astride for

a whole day, making fair progress.

Then he traded the nag to an artill-

eryman for a package of cigarettes.

Just as he knew would be the case,

the Tommy was able, with a cigar-

ette in his mouth, to make faster

progress about than astride.

Even civilian life has been drawn

upon by Tommy to move the Brit-

ish public to contributions. Follow-

ing the fall of Lieke last year, he

asserts that an aged man with two

grandchildren limped into Ostend af-

ter a tramp of over 100 miles. He

had no money and only what food

was given him by charitable people

along the way.

"But I had one thing," he told

the Tommies at Ostend, "that sus-

tained me wonderfully; my pipe and

plenty of tobacco. I don't believe I

should have been able to reach Ost-

end alive if I had not been able to

light up when I wanted to."

What worries Tommy in his pres-

ent agitation to secure tobacco con-

tributions, is the French. He insists

the French tobacco is vile. Yet he

had to admit that the French "pol-

ice" fights just as bravely as he does.

His only explanation is that possi-

bly the French soldier has some other

source of inspiration besides his

pipe. In which event, he argues, the

British should contribute all the

more liberally, first that he may not

be forced to have recourse to French

tobacco, and secondly that he may

not be rendered any less brave than

the French.

Rev. L. J. Sawyer, who came here

six weeks ago from the Hamilton

Square Baptist church, San Francisco,

to become pastor of the First

Baptist church of North Yakima,

has received a unanimous call from

the San Francisco church asking

him to return.

He was in charge of the San Fran-

cisco church 13 years. He has taken

an active part in church activities

since coming here. He said to-

day he did not expect to return to

San Francisco.

yesterday when he wandered into

the buffalo paddocks and gave battle

to one of the big male buffaloes.

The consequence was that the goat's

battered remains were taken to the city

incinerator for cremation last

night.

The goat got into the buffalo pen.

The leader of the herd took exception

to the invasion and charged. The

goat, instead of running, turned about

and putting down his head met the

enemy. The two animals clashed with

a thud and the goat was knocked

about 20 feet with nearly every bone

in his body broken.

From the outlook of foot ball in Portland this year Jefferson is considered one of the strongest teams in the state. By this date the local boys will have played all the scheduled games in eastern Oregon, and a fast team is expected to be ready to meet the Portlanders on this date. A Portland team has never been brought to Pendleton to play on the local gridiron but the boys feel that they have a chance to play the team, a hard game, and all that attend this one are promised a game full of thrills and excitement.

BODY FOUND NEAR COYOTE UNIDENTIFIED

Not Satisfied With Investigation by County Officials, Others Interested Will Probe Deeper Probable Murder.

COYOTE, Ore., Oct. 14.—The mystery surrounding the identity of the man whose body was found half a mile south of the government reclamation project, three miles west of here, has not yet been solved, and it is a question whether it ever will be, since apparently no steps are being taken to do so by the authorities.

The body was found October 4, covered by sage brush. A bullet hole in the back of the head indicated that the man had been murdered. The body was decomposed and no papers were found on the body that would lead to its identity. The coroner and a deputy sheriff from Heppner came to the scene October 6 and conducted an inquest. It was the verdict of the jury that the man met death at the hands of unknown persons. The body was attired in heavy underwear, soft shirt and a red necktie.

It is held, however, by persons here that the investigation by the county officials at the time was rather superficial, that measurements of the body were not taken, and that no attempt was made to trace his identity by marks on the clothing.

Others who investigated say that the man wore eyeglasses, and that from all appearances he was not a tramp. They also took measurements which may be of value in carrying on a further investigation. The man appeared to be between 55 and 60 years of age.
