### BOTH PARTIES TO UPHOLD PLANS FOR MORE PREPAREDNESS

#### ONLY ONE SENATOR OBJECTS TO IMPROVING ARMY AND NAVAL STRENGTH.

Poll of Congress Shows Members Are More Than 10 to One in Favor of Supporting President—Navy Given Preference by Many.

CHICAGO, Oct. 14.—Following is a summary of a newspaper poll of the members of congress on the question of an increase in the army and navy in the House.

Grand total 283. A poll of congressmen and senators shows that President Wilson's program for a bigger army and navy will have the almost unanimous support of both houses during the coming session.

The question, "Do you favor an increase in the army and navy for defense preparedness?" was put to all senators and congressmen. Thirty-five senators answered the question and only one, Vandaman of Mississippi is opposed to an increase. John Sharp Williams, the other Mississippi senator, favored a bigger army, but not a bigger navy.

**Democrats Favor Policy.** One hundred and ninety-four congressmen answered. One hundred and forty-six voted "yes," 12 were against the program and two favored a bigger navy, but no increase in the army.

The poll was taken by mail and it is only fair to those who responded to say that their votes were in the mails before the president made his public announcement to the navy advisory board that he stood for preparedness.

The result of the poll is believed to foreshadow what will happen when the defense program is brought before congress.

**Will Support President.** The ballots cast are more than ten to one in favor of a larger army and navy, indicating that whatever the president proposes will be passed.

The senators from California failed to answer the query, but five California congressmen were heard from. Only one, Randall, democrat, voted "No." The California congressmen who favor the larger army and navy are Kahn, republican; Ketter, democrat; Stephens, progressive; and Hayes, republican.

### MAN AND WOMAN ACCUSED OF MURDER IN YAMHILL COUNTY

#### WILLIAM BRANSON AND MRS. WILLIAM BOOTH CHARGED WITH TERRIBLE CRIME.

Branson Had Been on Bad Terms With Dead Man—Wife Seen in Vicinity Soon After Crime, Held to Have Been an Accomplice in Act.

WILLAMINA, Ore., Oct. 14.—William Branson, aged 25, charged with murder, and Mrs. William Booth, aged 30, accused as an accomplice, today were bound over to await action of the Yamhill county grand jury after an all-day preliminary hearing before Justice N. L. Atkins. In the case of the killing of William Booth, aged 29, near the Willamina brick plant last Friday.

Booth was shot to death. The state put on 15 witnesses and, after their testimony had been heard, rested, the defense waiving further hearing at this time.

The opera-house where the hearing was held, was packed, fully 600 persons from the country round, where Mr. Booth was well known, being in attendance.

Young Branson was arrested Saturday, the day following the finding of Mr. Booth's body up the road near the brick plant near here. The matter was kept quiet until Branson was taken and evidence secured which might lead to a clearing up of the case, through the arrest of Mrs. Booth.

Both Branson and Mrs. Booth were taken back to McMinnville tonight to be held until the grand jury meets there next month. The fact that Mrs. Booth was seen in the vicinity of the crime so soon after it happened led the authorities to believe she might have known something which would clear up the case. Her arrest followed shortly after that of young Branson, who had been on bad terms with Mr. Booth for some time. Mr. Booth had accused Branson of being too intimate with Mrs. Booth.

The complaint, charging Mrs. Anna Booth as an accomplice in the crime, was filed today, shortly before the hearing opened. Neither Branson nor Mrs. Booth appeared as nearly a score of witnesses testified for the state in the case.

The arrest of Mrs. Booth was one of the surprises on the part of the state.

### DICKINSON OUT AS HOTEL OREGON MANAGER

LONDON, Oct. 14.—In a dispatch from Petrograd, Reuter's correspondent says: "Polish refugees arriving here say that German officials declare that Poland will be surrounded by a triple line of trenches and barbed wire entanglements and that the Russians will be quite unable to dislodge them, for if there is a shortage of men the Germans will arm the entire masculine population of Poland and force them to fight the Russians."

Jackson, who has charge of the inspection of prison camps in Germany for the American embassy visited Doberbert recently to attend an entertainment given by the thousand English prisoners imprisoned there. These men were captured by the Germans. Jackson asked what the initials "C. L. V." after each performer's name meant. "It means," someone answered, "Churchill's Innocent Victims."

PORTLAND, Ore., Oct. 13.—Senators, congressmen and other men who have held or are holding Oregon's highest posts of honor paid their last tribute of respect to Abigail Scott Duniway yesterday afternoon.

The funeral services, held at the First Unitarian church, were attended by a throng.

From 1 o'clock until 2 the body rested in the church for the view of the many who wished to look upon the features of her who was Oregon's most celebrated woman.

The services were brief and simple. There was no sermon or eulogy. Rev. T. L. Elliot, pastor emeritus of the church, and an old friend of Mrs. Duniway, read from the Scriptures and offered a prayer. "Lead, Kindly Light," and "Nearer, My God, to Thee," were sung.

There were more flowers than could be heaped on the casket.

The active pallbearers were Leslie M. Scott, Ambrose B. Scott, John H. Scott, Paul H. Kelly, James S. McCord and Kenneth S. Latourette.

The honorary pallbearers were George E. Chamberlain, Harry Lane, James Withycombe, C. N. McArthur, Oswald West, C. W. Fulton, T. T. Geer, M. C. George, H. L. Pittock and George H. Himes.

Private services were held at Mount Scott cemetery for members of the family.

The body will be cremated. Memorial services for Mrs. Duniway, at which speakers will give their tributes to the qualities of her character and the achievements of her life, may be held next Sunday.

### SAILORS RETURN TO FAVOR BECAUSE OF CANAL'S CLOSING

BRITISH BARK CHARTERED AT 80 SHILLINGS FOR TRIP AROUND CAPE HORN.

Some sailors on Way But Fleet of Steamers Will Handle Most of Business to Europe—Steamers Were Loaded Recently for Long Voyages.

PORTLAND, Ore., Oct. 14.—Sailing vessels are coming to their own once more since the Panama canal has been blockaded by slides and there is a tendency toward stiffer rates for early loading, as was indicated in the engagement of two vessels taken yesterday, the British bark Inveresk at 85 shillings for February-March loading, and the British bark Holt Hill, at 85 shillings for January loading, with 25 extra if she arrives for December loading and 90 shillings if available in November.

The British bark Invergarry was fixed Tuesday at 80 shillings and will be a March ship. M. H. Houser took the Holt Hill and the Invergarry, while the Inveresk was engaged by Hind, Rolph & Co. Exporters have paid more attention to steam tonnage since a number of sailing vessels were taken the later part of the 1914-15 season for late fall and early winter loading, so the spurt of the past two days in squareriggers rather lends new interest to the charter market.

The Holt Hill is among the old traders in the North Pacific coast grain fleets and was reported arriving at Melbourne from New York October 2, so it is regarded improbable that she will make it here for November loading. The Inveresk reached Queenstown September 17 with a cargo of wheat loaded here, having sailed in April, and no doubt will be started on the return at once.

The Invergarry left Middlesbro, England, August 4, for Pernambuco and was spoken off Lizard August 18. The British steamer Haigh Hall finished loading grain at Montgomerie dock yesterday, although she may take on a small additional lot today before getting under way for sea.

The British bark Dolbadern Castle began working grain at Irving dock yesterday and is to be followed there by the Russian bark Fahrwohl.

There are a few sailing vessels on the way that should put in an appearance before the end of the month, but, save for steamers in the Pacific that have been taken for ocean transportation, there is little hope for a big fleet of them to be in the harbor until those detained on the east side of the Panama canal have time to make their way via the Straits of Magellan.
