Newsy Notes of Pendleton

Many in for Sale.

A large number of farmers from over the county are in today and will go out this afternoon to the Dave Nelson place northwest of town to attend a sale of farm implements and the like.

Off on Hunting Trip.

John Armstrong and Henry Thompson left today by automobile for a hunting trip in the southern part of the state. They expect to join the Matlock-Vaughan party which left yesterday for the same points.

Ill at his Home.

William Rhea, well known local resident has been seriously ill at his home in Garden street from ptomaine poisoning. He was taken ill Sunday. His son was notified and came down from Portland to help attend his father.

Touring the Northwest.

W. A. Hower of Canton, Ohio, and Thompson Pipes of Washington, Pa., were in the city yesterday, making their stop here in a trip to the northwest. They left yesterday for Spokane via Pasco. Mr. Pipes is a cousin of Martin Pipes, well known attorney of Portland.

To Take Body Back.

George W. Henry of Baker City, arrived today to take charge of the body of his brother, Robert W. Henry, who died yesterday at the Eastern Oregon State Hospital. The body was prepared for burial by the Folsom undertaking establishment and will be sent to Baker this afternoon.

Field Secretary Coming.

Announcement was received by the Commercial association this morning that Edward F. Trefz, field secretary of the United States chamber of commerce, will be in Pendleton on Monday, arriving from Butte, Montana. Mr. Trefz will speak here either in the afternoon or evening but the hour has not yet been arranged. A luncheon has been arranged for him following his arrival.

Performs Delicate Operation.

An operation that saved the life of a five-year old girl was performed in Astoria Wednesday by Dr. E. H. Waffle, the son of Mr. and Mrs. R. S. Waffle of this city. The little girl is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. H. Hogell of Astoria, and she was seriously burned when a playmate set her dress afire last July. Ten inches of skin was taken from the left leg of Mr. Hogell and grafted to the child's body. According to a letter received this morning from Dr. Waffle by his parents here, the child is now doing nicely and will completely recover.

Hearing in Contempt Case.

Olen Reek is being given a hearing this afternoon before Circuit Court Judge Phelps on a charge of contempt in connection with his alleged failure to follow out the orders of the court in the recent divorce proceedings in which he figured.

Fined for Fighting.

J. W. Donahue, arrested last night for fighting on the street, was arraigned this morning in police court and fined \$10 or five days in jail. He took the five days. Earl Lucas, also arrested for fighting, forfeited bonds of \$10 for his failure to appear before Judge Fitz Gerald this morning.

Farrell Leaves City.

Billy Farrell, who fought Tommy Clark last night, left on the local this morning, accompanied by his wife and brother. Farrell said he was going to Portland for a while and later might go on to Vancouver, B. C. He said he might return to Pendleton later.

Rivers is Acquitted.

Sam Rivers, who was arrested several days ago on a charge of bootlegging, was given a hearing this morning before Justice of the Peace Parkes but because of lack of evidence the case was dismissed. It was alleged that he gave liquor to Dick Johnson, an Indian.

Merchants Are Closing Up.

Following out the advice of Fire Chief Ringold, the merchants of the city have been making special efforts to have the yards in the rear of stores cleaned up and the progress so far has been satisfactory to the fire chief. Chimneys also are being taken care of, both in the business and residential sections.

Will Ship Out Horses.

Henry T. Hill who has been in the county buying up horses for use of the French government, will ship out a carload this afternoon for eastern points. Mr. Hill will be here another week or more and will be in the market for further purchases. It is reported that the prices for horses are better than a few weeks ago, an advance of \$20 per head being reported for the smaller stuff.

Sends Home Deer Meat.

Edgar Averill, who has been deer hunting, has shipped a quantity of deer meat to J. W. Coutts and the latter family has been enjoying venison on for the last several weeks. Mr. Averill is in the Coos Bay country instead of near Bear Wallow and, from reports reaching his friends here has succeeded thus far in killing two deer. Mrs. Averill is staying with friends at Eugene. They expect to arrive home some time next week.

Football Game Today.

The first football game of the season is being held today at Round-up park with the local high school lined up against the team from the Milton high school. The members of Pendleton high have turned out in force to lend their support to the football boys and a fast game is expected. This morning, the high school yells were practised and much enthusiasm was shown over the struggle which, it is believed, will develop the strength of the local gridiron warriors. The game started at 2 o'clock.

Many Teachers Will Attend.

The annual teachers' institute to be held in Pendleton on November 17, 18 and 19 will be the largest of its kind to gather in this city. It is estimated by County Superintendent Young that more than 400 teachers from Gilliam, Morrow, Wheeler and Umatilla counties will be present. Mr. Young is now at work on the program and he expects to have some prominent speakers here for the occasion. It is possible he will try to secure the services of Dr. Suzallo, president of Washington state university who recently came there from the east. Other notable speakers will also be on the program.

Big Players Will Come.

Owing to the falling through of plans to bring the Boston Sox and the Phillies to San Francisco, the All Stars which come here November 13 for an exhibition game, will probably have in the lineup some of the men who engaged in the recent world's series. Carl Cooley, who is handling the arrangements for the local exhibition game next month, said this morning that Cady and Hobbitt will be among the diamond stars to play here and that it is quite probable Alexander and some others of the "big boys" will make the tour with the All Stars. This information will be very agreeable to Pendleton and Umatilla county fans, for the interest in the world's series was intense here and the fans are anxious to see some of the champion players in action.

Has Ancient Almanacs.

C. L. Howers of the Round-up Feed yards, has some interesting relics in the shape of almanacs published in 1849, 1870 and 1873. Postmaster Tweedy wished to secure one of these old time pamphlets to put in the cornerstone of the new federal building but at the time Mr. Howers was unable to find them. He discovered them later, however, but it was then too late to place them among the other relics in the cornerstone. The almanacs were published in North Carolina, the boyhood home of Mr. Howers, and in those early days no household was complete without an almanac. These ancient pieces of literature might be termed the forerunner of our present popular priced magazines, for besides giving the phases of the moon and information of what to do in accidents, short stories make up the contents of the almanacs.
