#### WILL USE KELP FOR POWDER MANUFACTURE

SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 18.—The kelp, crop of the Pacific ocean is to be harvested by a powder company to obtain an ingredient used in making ammunition for the warring nations of Europe, it was announced today.

The statement is made one of the foremost manufacturers of powder has decided to spend \$5,000,000 in the enterprise to obtain the chloride of potash it needs to fill its war orders and which it can no longer obtain from Germany.

It has long been known that kelp, such as is to be found along the shores of the California coast is rich in potash. The difficulty has been to obtain the kelp in sufficient quantities and to handle it afterward.

Submarine Responder Devised.  
Kelp grows in long streamers that reach from the ocean bottom to the surface, being floated by fruit bulbs. When the top of the kelp is reaped the long trunks are likely to sink to the bottom. Also when the kelp is reaped it tends, on being exposed to

the air, to become "gluey" and worthless.

George H. Markell, secretary and general manager of the Hercules Powder Company, who is now in San Francisco, it is said, has designed a submarine reaper, and contracts for an experimental reaper have already been let, to be completed within 14 days. The reaper will cut the kelp in sixteen-inch lengths which will be sucked by a pump into a big wire basket.

Government to Supervise Trial.  
The pieces of kelp are then to be taken ashore and placed in roasting vats, the needed chemical substances being afterward extracted.

There are big kelp beds all along the California coast. The kelp may not be cut off in such a way as to destroy it, as it is the protection of spawning grounds. A trial of Monterey Bay, it is announced, will be made under government supervision as soon as the submarine reaper is completed.

Mr. Markell says that chloride of potash has risen from a former market price of \$75 a ton to well above \$200 a ton.

#### BRITAIN WANTS THREE MILLION BY SPRING

LONDON, Oct. 18.—"Great Britain needs 3,000,000 men by Spring."

This declaration was made today by Brigadier General Sir Erick Swaine, director of recruiting in the north, when he addressed a speech at Hull. General Swaine estimated that Germany still has between 2,000,000 and 3,000,000 men from the ages of 15 to 45, and that, therefore, it was useless to talk about wearing out Germany. In the spring, said he, Germany would lose more men than the allies, which would balance the number of the allies and the central powers, but if Great Britain should raise 3,000,000 additional men, Germany probably would recognize that it would be fruitless to continue.

Great Britain, he added, did not want compulsion, but unless 2,000,000 more men were recruited by spring the military authorities could not be responsible for the war.

After the dinner was completed, Rev. J. E. Snyder made a motion that Prof. Gambee of the High school act as temporary chairman of the meeting. #### SAGE AND GARLIC IN DEMAND AT GOOD PRICES

OREGON AGRICULTURAL COLLEGE, Corvallis, Oct. 18.—"Just now there is a demand for sage at unusually good prices," said Professor A. G. Bouquet of the Oregon Agricultural College Horticultural department. "Due to lack of importations from Austria and other countries at war there is an unusual scarcity, and growers having a surplus of the dried product can readily dispose of it to the Portland tea, coffee and spice dealers, such as Closet and Deyers firm. One Portland dealer told me that he was paying fifteen cents a pound, which is considerably better than the average price. Growers with sage to market can learn further particulars by addressing any of the Portland spice dealers."

"A somewhat similar situation exists with garlic, and I am informed that one or two cartons have been sent from Oregon to New York. In normal times Oregon growers cannot
