HIGH SCHOOL NOTES

Miss Butler, instructor in the domestic science department of the high school has arranged a very thorough course in that department for the night school work. The work will start as soon as twelve or more have signed up to take the work. The class will meet three times a week, on Monday, Wednesday and Friday nights between the hours of 7 and 9.

A fee of one dollar a week will be charged to cover the necessary expense incurred in employing a teacher and to furnish the necessary articles for the work. The following lessons will be given each week.

First week—Vegetable cookery, the value in diet and the best ways of cooking to produce the highest food value.

Second week—Pastry, its place in the diet and the boiling water pie crust explained, and dietetic value.

Fourth week—Cakes, the various methods of mixing and food value.

Fifth week—Hot breads and dietetic value.

Sixth week—Bread, best flours and yeast.

An Everyday Cake

Here is a simple and inexpensive cake that can be varied in many ways with different frostings and icings. It looks a little nicer baked in a tube pan, but will be equally as good baked in a square loaf.

K C Gold Cake

By Mrs. Janet McKenzie Hill, Editor of the Boston Cooking School Magazine.

1 cup butter; 1 cup sugar; yolks of 4 eggs, beaten light; 1 cup flour, less 2 level tablespoonfuls; 2 level teaspoonfuls K C Baking Powder; 1 cup milk; grated rind of 1 orange.

Sift flour and baking powder together three times; cream butter and sugar, beat yolks of eggs, add these to creamed mixture, and lastly add the moisture and flour alternately, beating better until smooth. Gold Cake can only be made successfully by beating yolks of eggs, very, very creamy and light lemon colored, using a rotary beater. The rotary beater is the only beater that will do justice to the yolks of eggs. The beating kills all egg taste and improves the texture of the cake.
