NEWSY NOTES OF PENDLETON

Ball Is Forfeited.

Ed Paterson, arrested for being drunk, failed to appear in police court this morning, and forfeited his ball of \$5.

Resolution Is Referred.

A resolution to provide for the prompt repairing of the city's streets in case of cuts and other injuries to the pavement was last night referred to the ordinance committee by the city council.

Special Council Meeting.

A special meeting of the city council will be held tomorrow evening beginning at 7:30 o'clock, at which time the matter of street improvements will be discussed. Several ordinances are expected to be introduced for paving.

Improvement Is Asked.

A petition signed by Ross E. Carney and others was presented to the city council last night asking for the paving of east Webb street from the east line of College street to the south line of Court street at State street. An ordinance to this effect was then introduced and read for the first time.

Will Look Up Title.

Judge Lowell in a communication to the city council last night sought

to gain permission of the city to purchase several cart-loads of earth from property where formerly there was a slaughter house, but it was the opinion of the council this land does not belong to the city. It was located near Olney cemetery. The title will be looked up to learn if the city has the right to grant this permission.

Will Build Shop.

Dunbar and Johnson have taken out a permit to construct a small shop in West Webb street. It will cost \$75.

To Settle Titles.

A suit to settle titles to land near Weston was filed in the circuit court today by Dr. F. D. Watts of Weston against Anna Young and others. Fee and Fee represent the plaintiff.

State Architect Here.

State Architect W. C. Knighton of Salem is here looking over the new wing of the Eastern Oregon State Hospital. He arrived yesterday and expects to leave tomorrow for Salem.

Hide and Junk Business.

The Pendleton Hide & Junk Co. is the title of a new concern just opened here with headquarters in the new frame building at the corner of West Webb and Garden streets. E. Epstein and G. Epstein formerly of Walla Walla are the men in the concern. They will deal chiefly in second hand goods and junk.

Will Repair Sidewalks.

The question of repairing sidewalks in the city was brought up before the city council last night and it was decided to have this work done at once. Many sidewalks throughout the city are in bad shape and should be put into good condition before the winter. The street committee was authorized to advertise for bids and a list of the sidewalks to be improved will be furnished later.

Washington School Wins.

In a football game yesterday afternoon at Round-up Park, the Washington school squad defeated the high school Midgets, 7 to 0. The line-up of the Washington team was as follows: Beck, center; H. Laborer Is Injured.

James Cox, employed by the Warren Construction company, was injured this afternoon while at work in Webb street. He was struck just below the right ear by one of the large iron hoops used by the paving gang and a severe gash was cut. The man was taken in an automobile to the office of Dr. Boyden where the wound was dressed. It will not prove dangerous.

Body Is Sent Home.

The body of the late Frank Wahler was sent away on No. 17 today for Portland and will thence be sent to the former home of the family at Auburn, Cal. The widow and child and a sister of Mrs. Wahler, accompanied the body. Delegations of the Electrical workers, of which Mr. Wahler was a prominent member, will meet the casket at Portland and also at Auburn. The burial will be made at Auburn.

Working on Assessment Rolls.

County Assessor C. P. Strain is toiling up the assessment rolls and expects to have them finished soon. The valuation of the county this year will be a trifle less than last owing to the fact that lands in the Freewater section have not been appraised so high. The lands in that section have been used almost exclusively for orchards. The total valuation of the county last year, including railroads, was approximately 49 million dollars.

Reassessment Is Approved.

An ordinance ratifying and approving the reassessment for the paving of Jackson street from Main to Blaine street, was passed last night by the city council. Councilman Murphy said there was some dissatisfaction among property owners over the assessment, particularly regarding a fill and a wall at either end of the street, some of the residents feeling that others were getting more benefit out of these improvements and that consequently the assessment should be made more equitable. City Engineer Kimbrell explained the method of making the assessment and said it was the same as has been approved by the city council but declared that if another plan could be devised he was willing to follow it out. The council were inclined to believe that the method is as fair as could be arranged.

Committee Appointed.

The subject of removing some of the buildings in Happy Canyon in order that the street may be opened through to Main was discussed by the Commercial Association yesterday afternoon at a meeting. A committee, comprising W. L. Thompson, J. Roy Raley and Mark Patton, was appointed to confer with Elmer Searcy, who has petitioned for the street's opening, to see what can be done in the matter. Mr. Searcy, who owns property in the rear of Happy Canyon and he petitioned for the opening of the street several months prior to the Round-up. He agreed, however, to let the matter go over until after the Happy Canyon feature of the Round-up this year. It is the hope of the committee that some arrangement may be made so that it will not be necessary to remove the buildings in Happy Canyon.
