NEWSY NOTES OF PENDLETON

Out of Hospital.

James M. Shaw, prominent farmer of Ukiah, left St. Anthony's hospital this morning after undergoing an operation for a tumor on the neck. He is now nearly recovered and expects to return to his home this afternoon.

R. Stevens, well known rancher of Riverside, has the honor to be the first to cross the new bridge over the Umatilla river at the east end of town. Mr. Stevens went over the new structure this morning in his Ford automobile. There is still some work to be done at the approaches but by Monday everything will be in shape so that traffic may be resumed.

Is Known Here.

Local friends of T. B. Phillips secretary of the businessmen's association of the Dalles were grieved this morning to learn that his daughter, Mrs. Dick Doyle, had committed suicide at the ranch of her husband near The Dalles. Mr. Phillips was here only a few days ago to attend the funeral of the late Frank L. Wahler, a local lineman. The suicide is said to have followed a quarrel between husband and wife in which Mr. Doyle was said to have threatened to secure a divorce. The woman left a note saying she could not live without him, then went to her bedroom and shot herself through the heart with a 38-revolver.

Ears As Legal Tender.

Congressman N. J. Sinnott of The Dalles, who was in the city this morning, says that over in Harney county the ears of jackrabbits are used as legal tender. He stopped at a general store there, while on a recent trip, and saw hundreds of these ears strung on a clothes line. He inquired the reason and was told by the proprietor that jackrabbit ears are just as good as gold. The merchant accepts the ears allowing a discount for them on goods purchased. The merchants then turn in the ears to the county court and receive the bounty. In Harney county this year, Mr. Sinnott said, bounties have been paid on over 600,000 jackrabbits.
