HOG MARKET SHOWS WEAKNESS

(From Thursday's Journal.) There was a soft spot in the hog market at North Portland today. With the bulk of the arrivals coming direct to a local meat company on contract from its country buyers at \$6.90 for tops, this price was considered about the extreme for offerings today, although a handful of small stuff went over the scales at \$7, the recent high mark.

Market for hogs again showed weakness in the eastern trade this morning with values generally quoted fractionally off.

Seattle Lawyer Named. OLYMPIA Wash., Oct. 29.—Fredrick Hansman, an attorney of Seattle, was appointed to the Washington

state supreme court by Governor Green Lister to succeed Judge Herman L. Crow, who died. Mr. Hansman is 61 years old and came to the state in 1877. For 24 years he has practiced law in Seattle. He served as secretary to Eugene Semple, governor of Washington in territorial days. He was born in Pennsylvania and educated at the Western University of Pennsylvania and at Harvard.

CAUGHT SEA OTTER WORTH AT LEAST \$750

SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 29.—A little dead sea otter, whose pelting gives him the distinction of being worth anywhere from \$750 to \$2000, has led the Fish and Game commission to order a special investigation into the conduct of John Rowley, taxidermist of the California Academy of Science and one of the leading fur experts of the Pacific coast. The sea otter was found in the net of a fisherman tending to his catch of sardines off Monterey.

A heavy penalty is exacted by the state for anyone who kills sea otter. Knowing this, the fisherman was advised by friends to send the dead otter to the California Academy of Science.

That was done. The otter was skinned. Then whispers reached the fish and game commission that Rowley did not intend to mount the otter. He was reported to be inquiring the best market price for sea otter fur.

Ernest Schaeffle, executive secretary of the fish and game commission, detailed P. H. Oyer, deputy to the commission, to go to Monterey and investigate the circumstances. Oyer is still investigating. The pelting of the otter is in possession of the fish and game commission. Discussing the charges against him Rowley said they were ridiculous. "I was away from the Academy of Science when this otter was sent from Monterey," said Rowley, "and knew nothing about it until a month or so later."

CHICAGO, Oct. 29.—George Ober-ton was arrested today while on his honeymoon here and returned to the state penitentiary to serve out a life sentence for murder. Ober-ton accused three months ago after serving 14 years of his sentence for killing a Chicago policeman in 1901. He was married here four days ago, but concealed his prison record from his wife. Ober-ton declares he is innocent of the crime for which he was sentenced.
