NEWS OF PENDLETON

Board Has Money to Lend.
The school board, at its special meeting last evening, discovered it had \$4000 in the sinking fund which is available as a loan. The board will loan the money at once, taking only first mortgage as security.

Blancett to Los Angeles.
Dell and Bertha Blancett, Round-up riders, who make Pendleton their headquarters, left today for Los Angeles where they plan to remain for some time. Mr. Blancett generally works in the movies during the winter months.

Supreme Court Adjourns.
Having held a night session last evening, the supreme court this morning adjourned its fall eastern Oregon session and the majority of the members left on No. 17 for Portland and Salem. Most of the attorneys here for the session have also returned home though some of the La Grande attorneys are remaining over for the football game this afternoon between Pendleton and La Grande high schools.

Buys Idaho Hogs.
C. E. Rude, well known stock buyer, arrived home yesterday morning from Boise near which city he purchased fifteen cars of hogs which he shipped to the Frye yards in Seattle.

Mr. Rule declares conditions are very prosperous about Boise. He expects a great deal of cattle feeding to be done in the Owyhee valley this winter, because of the abundance of feed. One Portland company is sending 4000 feeders there, he states.

Makes Store Improvements.
Aage Rosenberg has completed the stalling of a mahogany wall case 12 by 15 in dimensions, in his jewelry store.

Getting Line on Teams.
Coach Williams of the Baker high school football team, came over today to see the Pendleton-La Grande game in order to get a line on each team. The Baker school will meet both Pendleton and La Grande later in the season.

Hunting Season Closing.
Sunday is the last day of the open season on deer, grouse and pheasants in eastern Oregon and local hunters are making their final trips into the mountains. It is expected that many will be out with their guns on Sunday for a final try for grouse.

Recognize Oregon Day.
Tomorrow is Oregon Day at the Panama-Pacific Exposition in San Francisco, and, in order to let the exposition officials know that Pendleton recognizes the day, leading businessmen of the city sending a night letter tonight to the Oregon commission expressing the hope that the day proves a successful one.

To Begin on H. S. Grounds.
At the special meeting of the school board last evening, F. H. Hayes was given authority to proceed with the preparation of the plans for improving the high school grounds, and the board hopes to start work in the near future. The plans will include lawns, tennis courts and playgrounds. It is estimated that the cost of the improvement will be in the neighborhood of \$2000.

Witnesses Confessed Crime.
Two men, going under the name of Huff and Motley, were arrested recently in Vale along with Bill Ridings on a charge of horse stealing and yesterday were taken to Walla Walla as witnesses against a man accused there of stealing two horses. Sheriff Taylor and Deputy Estes went over and secured confessions from Huff and Motley that they stole a horse in this country from a man near the state line last month.

Lucas Sues for Commission.
Suit for \$2500 commission has been filed in the circuit court by F. G. Lucas against C. L. Hartsborn. The complaint filed by A. S. Cooley alleges that the Universal Sales & Exchange company of North Yakima, Washington, had a contract for the sale of Mr. Hartsborn's ranch 24 miles northwest of town, and that Mr. Lucas produced buyers who ultimately purchased the place. The broker alleges he was to get 5 per cent of the selling price of \$50,000, and so arrives at his claim for \$2500. —Enterprise Record-Chiefman.

Indian Ballplayer is Here.
Omer Casner, a professional Indian ballplayer who has been with the Seattle, Vancouver and Spokane clubs of the Northwest League during the past three months, is visiting the Hartsborn brothers on the Umatilla reservation and was in the city this morning. Casner is a catcher and outfielder and finished the season with Spokane, to which city he will report next spring. He is a Shawnee Indian and his home is in Oklahoma. Casner is a graduate of Carleton and played on the baseball team of that institution. While there he became well acquainted with Linestar Dietz, the Pullman football coach. Casner will leave soon for San Francisco to join his wife in a visit to the exposition.

H. S. Lecture Course.
With the Oxford company as the opening attraction the high school lecture course begins here November 15. The company is unusually strong and has a remarkably varied program. The tenor, Ogden, is the star, while Miss Colburn, contralto, is likewise a splendid reader. There are four numbers in the course instead of five as last year. Those numbers are secured at the same price as the entire five for last season, thus indicating a higher grade of talent. For single admission, this year the price will be \$1. Season tickets are \$1 for one and \$2.50 for each additional season ticket. The entertainments will all be held at the high school auditorium. J. L. White, northwest manager for the Kiltown-White company, has been here for several days past at work on the exposition.

District Attorney Frederic Taylor arrived home this morning from a successful hunt in the John Day country. He was accompanied by John Miller of Pilot Rock and Jerry Garvala of Mouthum. During the night snow fell and the men were unable to find the second bear when they returned the following morning. The larger bear fell before the gun of Miller. He was located by himself at the time when the bear was located by Garvala's dog and chased over the brow of a hill where Miller met it and beat the bullet into it in rapid succession.
