NOTE TO BRITAIN IS DEMAND THAT RIGHTS OF U.S. BE RESPECTED

BLOCKADE OF GERMANY IS DECLARED NOT TO BE EFFECTIVE

Neutral Rights Are Championed—Procedure Under Orders in Council Are Held to Be Illegal—Hardships Are Pointed Out—Change in Policy Is Demanded by America.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 1.—Couched in more emphatic language than heretofore employed in the American note to Great Britain this week, protesting against violations of American and maritime rights and demanding that further interference with our trade shall cease.

The United States declares: 1. That its sovereign rights have been invaded by the limitations, risks and liabilities imposed by Great Britain on the ships of neutral powers. 2. That the procedure observed by Great Britain under the various orders in council is illegal.

Blockade declared ineffective. 3. That the British blockade is described in the orders in council and applied thereunder, is not binding because it is not effective. 4. That the method observed by British cruisers in taking neutral

ships into port for visit and search works hardship on the neutral owners and shippers and is not in accordance with the requirements of international law.

Contraband List Arbitrary. 11. That the contraband list as expanded from time to time by Great Britain is arbitrary and in violation of recognized practice.

12. That British interpretation and application of the doctrine of continuous voyage is not in accordance with the interpretation and application of the doctrine by the north during the civil war.

The note, in spite of its extreme length—19,000 words—has a backbone of vigorous purpose, which will not fail to escape the attention of the British government and British people.

President Wilson, having forced Germany to conform its practices to the principles of international law, is now determined to obtain a like change in policy on the part of Great Britain. He realizes that the relations of the two nations cannot possibly arrive at the dangerous stage reached in those of the United States and Germany, because, in the first place, the matter at issue is one which concerns conditions of life instead of life itself, and in the second there is in force a treaty not to effect with Germany, which provides for the arbitration of all disputes of a legal or treaty nature.

Freedom of Trade Important. Nevertheless the president is aware that freedom of trade is in accordance with recognized practices of tremendous importance to the welfare of the United States. It was in the light of this knowledge that the draft of the note was prepared by Chandler Anderson, at the time legal adviser to the department of state, and revised by Secretary Lansing and subsequently by the president himself. Every statement made in the communication, therefore, represents the careful thought of the executive branch of the government and the administration is confident that the assertions and demands made will receive the united support of the American people.

Moreover, the language employed is expected to prove to the satisfaction of the German government and people that the United States is playing no favorites and is merely insisting that all parties to the great war shall respect American rights.

WHY DAN GAVE THE BOTTLE TO INDIAN

PORTLAND, Ore., Nov. 1.—Dan Connors had but one aim, and he wanted to roll a cigarette.

So what was there for him to do but hand the bottle to the Indian who was with him while he rolled it? That's what he said when he was arrested.

The government officer who arrested him near Fort Klamath last July suggested that he might have set the bottle on the ground or put it in his pocket.

Dan said he didn't think of that. Besides, the Indian to whom Dan handed the bottle, which contained whiskey, said that he had given Dan \$1.50 with which to buy it.

Dan pleaded guilty in federal court this morning and received the minimum sentence of 60 days in the county jail, a fine of \$100 and costs. He has been in jail since his arrest.

BUSINESS TOO MUCH FOR STEEL FACTORIES

NEW YORK, Nov. 1.—So great has been the general revival in the iron and steel trade from the United States, it was said by authorities today, that, with virtually every blast furnace and steel mill in the country working night and day to capacity, the demand for iron, steel and steel products cannot be satisfied, and it is today almost impossible to buy for immediate delivery pig iron, scrap or ingots in sizable quantities at any industrial plant in the country.

The revival, which began about the first of last July, has been coming on rapidly, with a deluge of orders since the middle of August, and may not yet have reached its high mark. Within these three months the price of pig iron, long regarded as the barometer of trade, has increased approximately 25 per cent, and that of steel and steel products—except steel rails—has gone up about 15 per cent.

At the present time the demand for pig iron and for the various lines of steel is in excess of the producing capacity of the furnaces and mills of the United States, reads a statement issued today by Justice E. H. Gary, chairman of the United States Steel Corporation. He adds:

"The manufacturers are unable to make deliveries entirely satisfactory to the purchasers with respect to a large majority of the different kinds of finished steel.

"There is nothing to indicate that there will be a decrease in the demand for any of these products for some time. While prices received are still low, they have been and are increasing and apparently will go higher, so that fair and reasonable profits may be expected."

MAN TWICE SAVES SWEETHEART'S LIFE

SAN BERNARDINO, Cal., Nov. 1.—Risking his own life in both instances, Richard Gay, a young rancher of Highlands, today twice saved the life of his sweetheart.

His two, driving a spring wagon were crossing a railroad track near Gay's ranch when unexpectedly a train swung around a curve a few feet away.

Gay hurried the girl bodily from the wagon, and leaped out after her, just as the engine smashed into the wagon. One of the horses was killed and a barrel of cyanide, to be used for fumigating purposes, exploded near the girl. Tying a handkerchief over her nostrils, Gay dashed through the poisonous fumes and carried the already unconscious girl to safety.

IDAHO MAN SHOTS FOUR, THEN ESCAPES

BOISE, Idaho, Nov. 1.—William Cameron of Carey, Idaho, shot and killed Mr. and Mrs. W. L. Adamson, his wife's parents; their son, James Adamson, and his own child, aged 18 months, at the home of the Adamsons.

He fled to the hills, and possums are now in pursuit. Cameron's wife started divorce proceedings against him recently. He went to the home of her parents to see her, and, failing to find her, he killed everyone in the house.

Cameron formerly ran a hotel and livery barn in Carey, but was unemployed for some time. When he came to his father-in-law's house he entered the kitchen door. Mr. Adamson forbade his entrance and started to eject him, when Cameron began to shoot, first killing his father-in-law and shooting down his mother-in-law, brother-in-law and the baby in turn. When the shooting began, Mr. Cameron fled from the house with the three other children and no trace of her has been found.

Mr. Adamson was one of the principal owners of the Blain Co-operative Mercantile Company in Carey, which was run by himself and his sons. The family consisted of four boys and three girls. They came to Carey 18 years ago from Cache City, Utah.
