### Wheat Trade on Coast at Standstill

While Europe is suffering rather desperately for wheat cargoes now afloat or about to be loaded along the Pacific coast, trade is almost at a standstill. Speculative exporting interests are taking a gambling chance on the future of the market and are not disposed to accept offers from abroad even at slightly higher prices than prevailing figures for their future shipments.

The flour market so far as export business is concerned, is quiet aside from the recent heavy selling to ship. The orient is practically out of the market so far as volume is concerned. Even though heavy business was offering from there, the higher prices being demanded for export trade flour, together with the extreme cost of freights, makes it impossible for either China or Japan to take hold.

The rice situation is having its effect upon the flour and wheat trade with the orient. United States Consul General George H. Seldmore writes from Yokohama, Japan, that the Japanese authorities to take immediate steps to export abroad some 2,000,000 koku (10,000,000 bushels) of rice, in order to relieve the depression on the rice market.

In the early part of the present year the price of rice fell to 15 yen per koku (\$1.2948 per bushel), and the authorities adopted certain measures to regulate the price, withdrawing the sum of 5,000,000 yen (\$2,490,000) from the treasury and purchasing large quantities of rice on the domestic market.

This step, however, had little result. Quotations in Tokyo, Osaka and other districts continued to fall, and at present—September—delivery rates at 10 yen per koku (9.996 bushel), while October delivery is quoted at 11 yen per koku (11.9926 bushel). The commercial paper fears that the market rates will show a still further depreciation when the new rice is officially placed on the market.

Official returns just issued indicate that this year's crop will exceed 57,000,000 koku (285,000,000 bushels). The annual consumption of rice in this country amounts to about 55,000,000 koku (275,000,000 bushels). It will thus be seen that there will be a surplus of some 2,000,000 koku (10,000,000 bushels). The authorities appear to be at a loss how to handle the situation seeing the recent measures were unsuccessful.

**British Capture Prices.** HALLFAX, N. S., Nov. 2.—The Dutch steamer Hambrun, from New York, and the steamer Hocking, from New York to Norfolk, were brought into port here by prize crews from a British warship.

The Hocking was formerly the Danish steamer Gronland, but was recently changed to American registry and was flying the American flag when overhauled by the warships.
