Many Have Been Recruited. LONDON, Nov. 2.—Premier Asquith in the house of commons said Canada has recruited 36,000, Australia 32,000, New Zealand 25,000, South Africa 65,000; New Foundland 16,000 and the West Indies, 2,000.

One Man Killed. WILMINGTON, Del., Nov. 2.—One man died of burns and 12 were seriously injured when fire swept the mechanical sorting room of the plant of the Dupont Powder works, at Carney's Point. Fire electricity probably caused the fire.

Will Get Bulgarian Grain. SOFIA, Nov. 2.—In an effort to relieve Germany's food shortage, German officials here are arranging for the export of Bulgarian grain through northeastern Serbia.

Berlin Reports Capture of 40,000. BERLIN, Nov. 2.—The war office announced that during October more than 40,000 prisoners were captured on the Russian and Serbian fronts.

Loss Submarine Admitted. PARIS, Nov. 2.—The loss of the submarine Turquoise in the Sea of Marmora as reported by the Turks was admitted. It was believed the crew was captured as the Turks claimed.

COL. REBER TO TESTIFY AT GOODRICH TRIAL.

SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 2.—Lieut. Col. Samuel Reber of the U. S. Signal Corps, Chief of Aviation has arrived here from Washington to testify at the court martial of Lt. Col. Lewis E. Goodier, as to what he meant by certain personal letters he wrote to Capt. Arthur S. Cowan, head of the San Diego Army Aviation school, which have been introduced as evidence.

Some of the letters Reber will be asked to explain contain such phrases as "flying pay" of which he wrote, "all you have to do is to sit tight and draw your pay."

In referring to the case of Capt. Patterson, who was certified by Col. Reber as an actual flier, when Patterson had, according to testimony, but 54 minutes of instruction, Reber said he had written Cowan long after he had certified Patterson.

"It is rather embarrassing to me, because Capt. Patterson has not spent an hour in the air. However, nobody has noticed it as yet. No questions have been asked."

Another letter read in evidence said: "I am afraid some day somebody is going to question us as to why he (Patterson) is qualified as an aviator."

his boat left the Santa Clara were able to return to the steamer and later were rescued by breeches buoy by the Coos Bay life saving crew.

Mrs. E. K. Rooney and Mrs. Hale of South Bend, Ind., are now reported saved.

There are, however, still several missing.

Scene 20 Miles from Marshfield. The scene of the wreck is about 20 miles from Marshfield and those who were rescued are being cared for in little summer cottages along Bastendorf beach. The rescue work was all but finished as darkness fell, but in the night it has been almost impossible to find those who were washed ashore half lifeless.

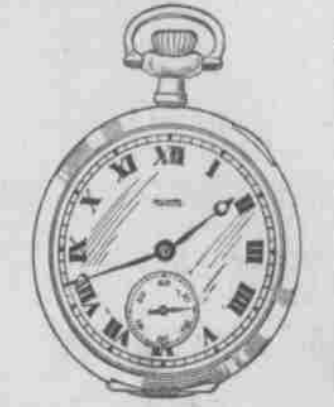
The wrecked vessel is about half a mile from shore and some who were not discovered were washed ashore with their lungs filled with water and sand.

Several of the lifeboats were either capsized or were swamped after being put out.
