WHITLOCK IS COMMENDED.

BERLIN, Nov. 5.—Among the news given out for publication by the German News Agency was the following:

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Britain to Tax Americans.

LONDON, Nov. 5.—The Chancellor of the Exchequer, Reginald McKenna, promulgated an order under which agencies of American mercantile firms operating in Great Britain will be compelled to pay an income tax on the basis of their total earnings in Great Britain, including money returned to the United States.

Hitherto these agencies have paid an income tax only on the profits expended in this country. The new tax will hit some agencies hard and may have the effect of discouraging the importation of what in war time are considered luxuries.

Armour & Co. the Standard Oil company and similar firms duly incorporated here and paying an income tax as such will not be affected by the new ruling.

The British government for some time has been grappling with the agency problem, trying vainly to force taxes from agencies which consistently showed no profits, due to the fact that goods were billed to them at prices making local profits impossible. It is declared, though the profit to the American factory was handsome.

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
