Modern Household Hints

By the Domestic Science Class of the Pendleton High School.

Mince Meat.
1 chopped apple; 1-2 c. raisins chopped; 1-2 c. currants; 1-4 c. suet; 1 T. molasses; 1 T. cider; 1 c. sugar; 1 t. cinnamon; 1-2 t. cloves; 1-2 grad nutmegs; 1-3 a. mace; 1 t. salt.

Add enough meat stock to moisten, heat gradually and simmer ten minutes. Then add one cup chopped meat. Cook fifteen minutes.

Chocolate Pudding.
1-2c. butter; 1 c. sugar; 2 eggs; 1-2c. milk; 1-2 t. baking powder; 1 1-3c. flour; 1-2 t. cinnamon; 2 T. chocolate; 1-2 t. vanilla.

Cream butter and sugar, add eggs. Sift dry ingredients together, then add flour and milk alternately, add vanilla. Steam forty minutes. Serves four.

Steamed Date Pudding.
1-4 c. molasses; 1-4 c. suet; 1-4 c. milk; 3-4 c. flour; 1-2 t. soda; 1-8 t. B. dates; 1-4 t. allspice; 1-18 t. cloves; 1-3 t. cinnamon.

Rub two T flour through dates, stir molasses, suet, and milk together. Sift dry materials, add dates last. Steam for two hours.

Cream Puffs.
1 c. boiling water; 1/4 c. butter; 1 c. flour; 4 eggs.

Bring water and butter to boil, add flour, stir vigorously. Remove from fire and let cool. Add eggs one at a time. Drop on ungreased pan and let bake in hot oven for forty minutes.

Filling for Cream Puffs.
4 T. flour; 1 c. milk; 1 egg; 4 T. sugar; 1 t. butter; 16 drops vanilla. Scald milk in double boiler. Mix

eggs, flour, sugar and butter with enough cold milk to moisten. Add to hot milk and cook fifteen minutes. Insert knife in side of puff and fill with the filling.

Cocoa and Chocolate.
Cocoa and chocolate are different from tea and coffee because they contain certain food that the body can use. Like tea and coffee, however, they contain a stimulant. They are made from the bean of the cocoa tree. A native of the American tropic.

The beans are about the size of almonds and are freed from the pod and are allowed to ferment in evens or in holes in the ground for two days.

The flavor of the product depends upon the perfect fermentation, the beans are then dried in the sun and changed from white to their peculiar red. They are next roasted and the shells removed. These shells are ground and give us the cocoa nibs. The roasted kernels are next crushed making a true cocoa nib, then this is mixed with sugar, spices and flavored or plain unsweetened chocolate. It is then run into moulds and we have our cakes of chocolate. If cocoa is to be made, some of the fat is pressed out. Tannin is found in the raw bean but is rapidly changed and forms the red color when it is in the sun. Theobromine, which is a stimulant same as caffeine but is milder in its effects. Since it is a stimulant, cocoa and chocolate are used as beverages and flavoring. If young children are easily excited, be careful about giving them much chocolate or cocoa.

Composition of cocoa—Theobromine, 1.66 per cent; fat, 41.74; starch, 28.45; cellulose, 4.70; ash, 2.16. c. stands for cup. t. stands for teaspoon. T. stands for tablespoon.

THOUSANDS OF VILLISTAS ON RETREAT TO NOGALES

ONLY SEVERELY WOUNDED ARE ALLOWED TO DROP FROM THE RANKS.

NACU, Ariz., Nov. 5.—Doctors Miller and Tripgen and chauffeurs Plyant and Wilson, reported to have been killed at Ocuca Prieta by a Carranza shell are alive. They are held prisoners at Cananea and will be freed today, Villa officials said.

NACU, Ariz., Nov. 5.—Thousands of Villistas have passed through Naco, Sonora, apparently headed for Nogales. Many slightly wounded, are in the ranks, only the severely wounded being allowed to drop out. They all seem to have sufficient food.

Villa gave questioners the exact location of the graves of Doctors Miller and Tripgen of Cananea and Nat Wilson and Joe Plyland, chauffeurs, Americans, who he declared had been killed by Carranzista shells while attending wounded near Agua Prieta.

GALVESTON, Nov. 5.—Ten thousand Carranzistas are en route from Jexico to aid General Dieguez in his advances against the Villistas according to advices here. It is reported that great Britain has recognized Carranza.

Gold Causes Excitement.
OATMAN, Ariz., Nov. 5.—A body of one four feet wide, assaying from \$11.15 to \$14 per ton in gold, was uncovered in a cross cut on the 200-foot level in the Ivanhoe Consolidated mines. The strike caused a wave of excitement throughout the district.

GRANDDAUGHTER OF NEW YORKER MADE WAR PRISONER

LONDON, Nov. 6.—Reports have reached here that Lady Halyh Paket, granddaughter of Mrs. Paran Stevens of New York, has been made a prisoner of war by the Bulgarians. Lady Dalph was a leader in the British Red cross work in Serbia and has been active in attending the wounded there since the war began. Her husband was formerly minister to Serbia and she has spent much of her life in that country.

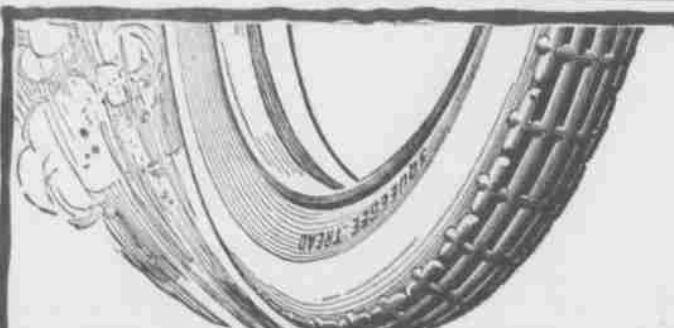
