Milton Couple Get License.
A marriage license was issued this morning to Ingvar J. Anderson and Charlotte Jaunita Persol, a Milton couple.

Body of Murdered Brakeman Here.
The body of Brakeman Burns, one of the two brakemen murdered last week at Vista, Wash., just out of Kennewick by a hobo, is in Pendle-

ton today en route to North Platte, Neb., for burial. It is being taken back by Mr. Wiseman, a friend. Burns and another brakeman had entered a car to round up some hoboes suspected of stealing clothes. One hobo fired, and the other brakeman was killed instantly. Burns was struck in the shoulder and knocked off the train, his skull being crushed in the fall. Six suspects are being held at Kennewick.

President J. V. Tallman of the Commercial association has received a letter from A. L. Meigs stating that the trail from Astoria to Spokane, through Pendleton, has been blazed by an automobile and the distances between points carefully computed by speedometer.

Narrowly Missed Being on Ship.
A card received from Jack Wohlenberg, former local merchant who is now in Marshfield, states that Mrs. Wohlenberg missed being on the ill-fated Santa Clara only by one boat. He sent a picture showing the wrecked ship on the Coos Bay bar.

Tax Liens Foreclosed.
Saturday afternoon a great many pieces of property in Umatilla county, nearly fifty in all, were sold by Sheriff Taylor to satisfy tax liens against them. Much of the property was bought in by the county though John Vert was the successful bidder in a number of instances.

Expects Many at Institute.
County Superintendent I. E. Young expects fully 200 teachers at the institute which is to be held here next week for the teachers of Umatilla, Morrow, Gilliam and Wheeler counties. Supt. Young is preparing a program of exceptional merit and will be ready to announce it soon.

Round-up's Annual Meeting.
The annual stockholders' meeting of the Northwestern Frontier Association will be held tomorrow evening in the Commercial club rooms for receiving the report on the 1915 show from the Round-up directors and for electing directors for next year. The directors will meet this evening to get their reports in shape. Only stockholders of the association are eligible to attend the meeting.

Joins U. S. Commercial Club.
The Pendleton Commercial association has applied for membership in the Chamber of Commerce of the United States of America with headquarters at Washington and has received notice that the application will be acted upon at the next meeting of the directors. Membership entitles the club to receive free of cost all publications conducted by the chamber including National Business, General, Legislative and Federal Trade Commission Bulletins.

Land Board Starts Suits.
The state land board, consisting of Governor Withcombe, Secretary of State Olcott and Treasurer Kay, today filed two suits in the local circuit court for the foreclosure of mortgages. Charles W. Davis and wife are the principal defendants in one, the board claiming a note of \$1800 executed by them. W. A. Gilliam, administrator of the estate of Charles and Catherine Ogilvy, and the Ogilvy heirs are the principal defendants in the other which is for \$2000 and interest. Charles H. Carter is attorney for the land board.

To Exhibit Round-up Films.
The first exhibition of the 1915 Round-up films in this city will be given tomorrow morning at 10 o'clock in the Temple Theater for the stockholders of the association. Manager Frank Downey tendered the directors the use of the theater for this private exhibition. If the pictures are satisfactory, two or three sets will probably be sent to the Panama-Pacific exposition to take the place of the past year films now being exhibited there. Some delay has been caused in getting these films out through an entanglement in which the photographers found themselves.

Automobile Damaged by Fire.
The little Saxon auto, owned by Ray Hicks, Northern Pacific express agent, was badly damaged by fire about 10:30 this morning. He had stopped it in front of the Independent Garage on East Court street to fill his gasoline tank and was just cranking it up when the spark ignited the gasoline. The flames shot high in the air despite the efforts of the garage men to put them out with Pyrene. W. I. Gadow turned in an alarm and the fire truck responded. A hand tank of chemicals soon put out the fire. The woodwork and seat of the car was destroyed and considerable other damage done.
