6 BOYS FINED FOR PRANK. SILVERTON, Ore., Nov. 8.—Following a Halloween escapade which ran far into the night of Sunday and resulted in the arrest of three boys by the marshal, six Silvertown youths this week were fined guilty of disturbing the peace and fined \$7.50 each. One boy paid his fine, but the others were compelled to become prisoners in jail and work out their fines by cleaning up the city streets and parks. Marshal Yates at first arrested Herman Quail, Ed Tanson and Harry Armstrong, but allowed them to go to their homes soon after their arrest Monday morning following their

promise to appear at the recorder's office later that morning. They did. It was from these three boys that the names of three others were procured, and then Harry Hutton, Max Roberts and "Shorty" Tallman were arrested. They, too, were fined \$7.50. A charge of stealing bananas was also placed against the boys.

Serious Accident Narrowly Averted at O-W Crossing

How a serious accident was narrowly averted at Yoakum station recently is told in the following letter to Superintendent Bollons, submitted for publication by the O-W. R. & N. Co. in connection with its Safety First propaganda: Umatilla, Ore., Oct. 11, 1915. Mr. W. Bollons, Supt., La Grande, Ore. About 11:20 a. m. today I stood in front of the Yoakum wheat warehouse and heard station whistle sounded by a westbound freight train that had not yet in sight. A moment later I saw the locomotive as same reached tanger, and a moment later heard regular crossing whistle sounded, at the same time saw a six horse team with wheat wagon approaching crossing from the south side. Drivers attention appeared to be direct ahead and drove on the crossing in the face of the approaching train. When his front wheels reached the south rail engineer sounded a series of short blasts of whistle, when driver apparently "come to" and whipped up his horses, when rear of the wagon just cleared the plot. The wagon contained three men and a stationary gasoline engine. We escaped what might have been another serious accident upon a grade crossing, yet clear view for a long distance can be had by parties approaching and passing over the crossing. Ample warning was given by the engineer, and responsibility rested with the driver. I returned to the warehouse.
