### JORDAN SAYS PEACE PROPOSALS WILL BE MADE BY CHRISTMAS

WASHINGTON, Nov. 12.—Definite overtures toward peace from a group of leading neutral nations will be made by Christmas. Chancellor Jordan of Stanford University predicted today. The optimistic statement followed a visit to President Wilson in the capacity of a delegate from the international peace congress at San Francisco to urge the president to join in creating a neutral nations' commission to further peace. On December 14, peace delegates of the leading neutral nations will meet at Bern, Switzerland. From this session, Jordan said, is expected to develop a commission of quasi-official delegates from neutral countries who will address a mediation proposal to the belligerents. He expressed the belief, regardless of America's action toward the proposal, that other countries will act anyway.

Commenting on his visit to the president, Jordan said: "I merely called the president's attention to our desire that he cooperate with neutrals in establishing a body to unite on continuous efforts toward conciliation. The commission would act as a sort of clearing house for peace ideas."

Dispatches from Italy say that Prince von Buelow, the former German ambassador to Rome has been sent to Switzerland to initiate peace negotiations. The report says that the Prince is now at Luzerne, where he will remain for three or four weeks, conferring with Mgr. Marchetti, papal delegate to Switzerland, regarding a peace program to be forwarded to Pope Benedict, who will in turn submit it to the Entente powers. It was reported a week ago that Prince von Buelow was on his way to the United States to initiate peace negotiations here.

Paul C. Dormitzer to Represent Self and Others in Criminal Trials. BAKER, Ore., Nov. 12.—Indicted on three counts for obtaining money under false pretenses, Paul C. Dormitzer was, until recently, attorney for four prisoners, including himself, who appear on the November docket of the circuit court.

He will defend himself on charges of obtaining money under false pretenses, but fearing complications, Judge Anderson refused to allow him to represent Fred Springer, charged with "assault and robbery," being armed with a dangerous weapon," and Joe Vallini, charged with theft from a bunkhouse.
