160 ACRES OF LAND ON PROJECT BOUGHT BY ADAMS RANCHER

F. H. Hudemann, well known farmer, gets quarter section from Clark.

50 Acres is Now in Alfalfa. While five is in bearing orchard—New Owner Will Develop Remaining Land This Fall—Four Acres Purchased by Mr. Hudemann.

Special Correspondence. HERMISTON, Nov. 17.—J. H. Hudemann, well known wheat rancher of Adams, recently purchased 160 acres on the Umatilla project from Joe Clark, about five miles east of this city.

Fifty acres of the quarter section is now in alfalfa and an additional five is bearing orchard. The remainder is still in a raw state and will be developed this fall by the new holder.

Four four-acre tracts were purchased by Mr. Hudemann yesterday.

He left today for Adams for his 16 head of mules which he will use in developing his alfalfa ranch. The teams other idle in the winter months will be used in the improvement of lands in this section.

Mr. Hudemann's wheat ranch is between Adams and Pendleton, having six acres under cultivation.

U. S. Keeps Eye on Fair. WASHINGTON, Nov. 17.—J. W. Bevans, assistant chief of the customs division of the treasury department, was ordered to San Francisco to oversee the closing of the Panama-Pacific exhibition and to watch foreign exhibits which were permitted to enter free of import duties.

Russians Ascend Danube. GENEVA, Nov. 16.—According to a message from Bucharest, the Russians have ascended the Danube and landed a small force of troops and artillery near Silistria, Rumania. Silistria is on the southern bank of the Danube in Rumanian territory, some 40 miles east of where the river reaches Bulgarian soil.

Russian Debt Grows. PETERSBURG, Nov. 17.—According to estimates of the state credit department, the national debt in January, 1916, will amount to \$5,387,499,925, or \$3,169,714,195 more than last year. The estimates assign for the payment of interest \$4,550,000 more than last year and \$18,150,000 for the payment of the principal.
