CAPTAIN HOBSON IS HERO STILL AMONG YOUTH OF COUNTRY

EXPLOIT OF SINKING THE MERRIMAC WILL ALWAYS LIVE IN HISTORY.

He and Dr. Edwin L. Stearns Well Pitted to French High Ideals to Young Men -- Hobson Was 18 Years in Navy and His Written Several Books on Naval Affairs.

Two men better equipped to go among the young men and preach to them high ideals would be hard to find than Captain Richmond P. Hobson and Dr. Edwin L. Stearns, who were here last evening as representatives of the national anti-saloon league.

Captain Hobson, by his daring and spectacular feat of sailing the Collier Merrimac into the entrance of Santiago in the teeth of the Spanish fire and sinking it in an effort to bottle up the fleet, came out of the war, as Judge Lowell in introducing him said, "the one enduring figure in history." His name has been heroized by the nation for 17 years and, naturally, every boyish mind regards him with more or less romance.

Captain Hobson spent 18 years in the navy, entering Annapolis when he was 14. After the Spanish war he became a captain and later wrote several books on naval matters. He is 45 years old.

VANISHING GAME IN STATE TO BE UNDER PROTECTION OF LAW

GAME BOARD PUTS MOUNTAIN SHEEP, ANTELOPE AND ELK ON LIST.

Hunters Must Not Destroy Them—Winter Fishing on Deschutes Ordered Closed—Butte Creek Also Closed—Hatchery Will Be Erected There—Rewards Offered.

PORTLAND, Ore., Nov. 17.—Steps to preserve the fish and game of the state were taken by the state fish and game commission in its monthly meeting yesterday at the offices in the Pittock block. The Deschutes river was ordered closed to winter trout fishing and a reward of \$100 was posted for the arrest and conviction of anyone shooting antelope, mountain sheep or elk at any time in this state.

Recommendations of W. L. Finley state biologist, on the need for the utmost protection of elk, mountain sheep and antelope were followed by the board. Mr. Finley reported that there is but a small remnant of bands of mountain sheep that formerly made their homes in the mountains of eastern Oregon. He believes that not more than 50 or 40 animals are now left alive in the mountains of northeast Oregon.

Extirmination of Antelope Feared. Antelope have also been nearly exterminated, he said, and are in a fair way to be wiped out altogether unless the strong arm of the law is thrown around them to give additional protection. He estimates there are perhaps 1000 antelope remaining in eastern Oregon.

The elk, he said, which are found in small numbers in sections of the coast mountains, are the best type of elk to be found anywhere and he regarded it as extremely important that they be saved from hunters. They are the big Roosevelt elk, he said, superior in size and color to any other. It is thought by the commission that the additional safeguard will have the effect of saving these three types of wild animals from utter extermination.

The closed season on the Deschutes river will be effective each winter from December 19 to March 31. It was stated that the people of that district are favorable to doing away with winter fishing and the order was made. A similar ruling was made effective in regard to Butte creek, where it was decided to establish a hatchery.

Residents to Help With Hatchery. Construction of this plant will go ahead at once. Residents of that section have shown considerable interest and will assist in the construction of a hatchery.

The meeting yesterday developed into an all-day affair. In the morning the commission visited Reed college to see the collection of skins of birds and animals of the state that have been collected, said to be the most complete showing of native life ever made.

In the afternoon the session was continued at the office in the Pittock block. George W. Mitchell was named a deputy game warden in Walla Walla county to fill a vacancy.

Present at yesterday's meeting was the full commission, Governor Withycombe, I. N. Fleischer and Frank Warren, Portland; J. F. Stone, Klamath Falls, and Marion Jack, Pendleton. The fiscal year closes November 30, and the commission decided yesterday to meet soon.

ZEPPELIN VISITS SOFIA

GERMANS EXHIBIT GREAT AIRCRAFT TO PEOPLE OF BULGARIAN CAPITAL.

BERLIN. (By wireless to Sayville, N. Y.) Nov. 17.—The arrival at Sofia of a German Zeppelin, after an eight-hour voyage from Temesvar, Hungary, across Southern Hungary, Northeastern Serbia and Northwestwestern Bulgaria, is reported in a dispatch from Sofia given out by the Overseas News Agency.

The Zeppelin had the Duke of Mecklenburg on board, says the dispatch. The airship was visited by King Ferdinand directly after its arrival. After virtually all Sofia had visited and admired it, the airship started on its return voyage.

Albany Levy 14 1-2 Mills

ALBANY, Ore., Nov. 17.—A tax levy of 12 1-2 mills for the ensuing year was passed by the city council. This is half a mill less than last year's levy. The budget has the following items: General running expenses, \$6 mills; interest on and reduction of warrant indebtedness, 2 mills; interest on bond indebtedness, 1.85 mills; sinking fund, \$75,000 refunding bonds, .45 of a mill; \$25,000 city hall site bonds, .15 of a mill; \$19,000 sewer bonds, .15 of a mill; \$8,000 sewer bonds, .05 of a mill; library fund, .50 of a mill; interest on sinking fund for proposed bond issue, 1.25 mills.

Bridge Work Resumed

ALBANY, Ore., Nov. 17.—Work on the steel bridge over the Santiam river at Lebanon has been resumed. The delay was caused by the failure to get the steel County Surveyor Gaddes, who is inspecting the work, said it will not be completed until about Christmas time.

INTERNATIONAL CHARACTERS TAKEN IN POLICE DRUG RAID

NEW YORK, Nov. 17.—In raiding the apartments of "Doc" Henry Beigel, well known transatlantic card player, and arresting him, the police believe they have broken up one of the largest sources of illicit drugs in New York.

When Beigel was arrested in his apartments in West 112th street, a fashionable neighborhood, by detectives from the narcotic squad, the officer found in the apartments four bottles of what is said to be morphine, as well as memoranda which showed that Beigel was in the habit of buying between 150 and 200 ounces of cocaine, heroin and morphine every few days from the New York Quinine company, the Mallinckrodt chemical company and a St. Louis concern, posing as a commission agent selling to dealers in Cuba and South America.

The drugs never reached South America, it is said, but were sold through the cabarets and dealers in the Tenderloin districts to drug fiends in the city.

The detectives have been working on the case since last summer. Beigel was arrested in London last December, charged with being a spy, but was later released.

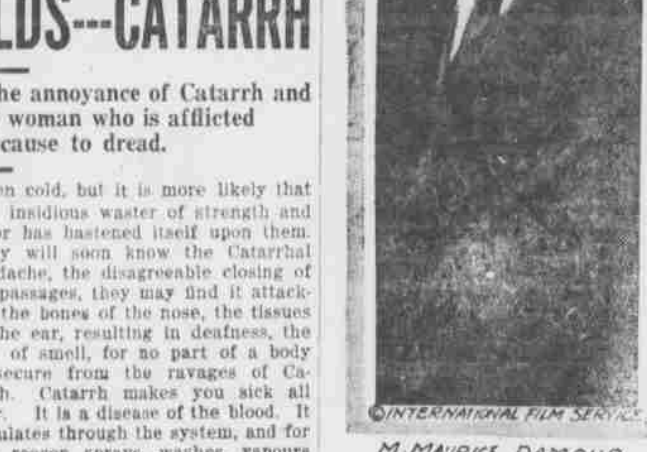
Vancouver Councilman Says Fun of Campaign Worth More.

FRENCH COMMISSION TO SPEND \$160,000,000 HERE

NEW YORK, Nov. 17.—Maurice Damour, formerly French consul general at New Orleans, and now secretary of appropriation of the French chamber of deputies, who heads the new French industrial commission arrived in New York aboard the new French liner Lafayette, to arrange for the purchase, at the conclusion of the war, of \$160,000,000 worth of structural steel, iron machinery and industrial supplies formerly imported into France from Germany.

BERNE, Nov. 16.—Bulgaria has called up all her male subjects between the ages of 20 and 40, including those hitherto exempt from military service. The latest levy also includes recruits living abroad, the latter being ordered to use every means to get home.

Kaiser Decorates Wife of U. S. Ambassador

BERLIN, Nov. 17.—Mrs. James W. Gerard, wife of the American ambassador to Germany, has been decorated by Kaiser Wilhelm with Red Cross gold medals of the first and second class. This is the first time the Kaiser has bestowed a decoration upon a woman not of royal blood.
