PENDLETON TO HAVE STRONG BASKETBALL TEAM THIS SEASON

QUINLET WILL BE MADE UP OF EX-UNIVERSITY OF OREGON PLAYERS

Pendleton will be represented by a basketball team during the approaching season that would do credit to some of the northwest colleges. As a matter of fact it will almost be a college team, a quintet composed of ex-University of Oregon players. Three men who made their letters on Oregon teams and two other ex-university players will be on the line-up.

Don Rice, who is working at the Hartman Abstract Co., Tom Boylen, Jr., who is on his father's ranch near Echo, and Irwin Brooks, bookkeeper at the Athena bank, all played regularly on the Oregon basketball team during their college career, the first two named having been guards and Brooks forward. W. K. Livingston, science instructor and basketball coach at the High School played basketball at the State university while Harold Cochran of the First National Bank force played freshman ball at the university last year and prior to that played on the Medford high school team. James Bowler, who will also play with them, played in Denver high and the University of Colorado.

The local players are practicing two or three times a week at the high school gym. Brooks who is coaching Athens high school, is keeping himself in condition by running marathons with the woods on the ranch. Before games they plan to get together for teamwork practice. This team, minus Boylen, gave the Athena high school a bad drubbing last week without any practice at all, and is now planning to schedule games with the local high school team, Walla Walla Y. M. C. A., the La Grande M. I. K., Echo and other eastern Oregon teams.

DEPRESSION SHOWN GENERALLY IN HOGS IN PORTLAND YARDS

(From the Journal.) PORTLAND, Ore.—Weakness was shown in the hog trade generally throughout the country with further price loss in practically all markets. Locally there were but limited arrivals, but the trend of the trade was weaker and prices lower. Good hogs were down 10c to 15c.

CHICAGO, Nov. 18.—A Caesarian operation in which twin girls were born, was undergone by Mrs. Charles Hanson at Silver Cross hospital in Joliet.

The operation, when twins are to be born, is said to be unusual. Dr. G. M. Pearls, of Joliet, was in charge of the operation. He has given special attention to obstetrics for 25 years, and states he had never heard of a similar case.

Dr. Pearls has performed a number of Caesarian operations, which are rare even when birth is given to but one child.
