### VILLA SOLDIERS SAID TO DARE THE AMERICAN FORCES TO FIGHT.

NOGALES, ARIZ., Nov. 25.—United States troops with an ambulance in attendance, have been hurriedly rushed into position along the international boundary bisecting this place from the Mexican town in Sonora of the same name.  
Acting Governor Carlos Ballal said that several Villa officers in Nogales are drunk and beyond his control.

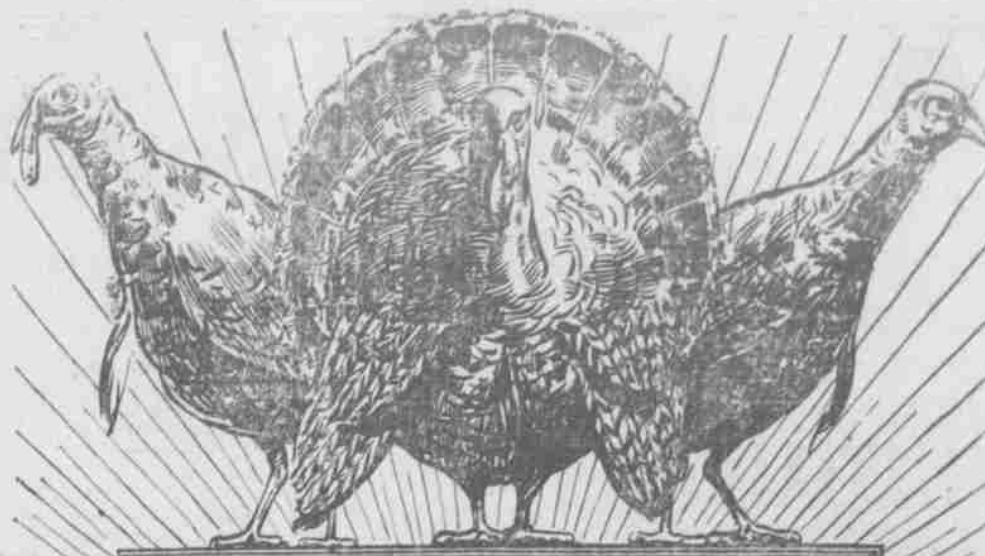
Other detachments of United States troops are clearing the streets on the Arizona side and are barring the progress of all persons across the line in either direction. All saloons were hurriedly closed on the Sonora side, and the Americans who were in them were ordered out at the point of guns.

Mounted Villa soldiers are reported to have hurled insults across the line at the American soldiers, daring them to fight.

LOS ANGELES, Nov. 24.—The first court in the history of California and probably in the history of the nation in which judge, clerk, bailiff and reporter were all women, and in which no man had any part was held here recently. Fourteen cases were tried and disposed of by the judge, Miss Orfa Jean Shantz, who was recently appointed referee of the juvenile court.  
The scope of the court includes all cases in which girls in their minority are defendants and which concern boys up to nine years of age.
