ONCE DISMISSED IN DISHONOR, NOW HOLDS REAR ADMIRAL'S JOB

CAPTAIN FITZHERBERT WAS LET OUT OF BRITISH NAVY IN 1910.

Appointment to New Position Comes Squarely Against the Traditions of the Service—European War Puts New Aspect Upon Matter and Promotion Is Made.

LONDON, Oct. 26.—(By Mail.)—Dismissed in 1910 with dishonor for losing his ship, Captain E. S. Fitzherbert has just been appointed rear admiral of the British navy, squarely against the traditions of the service.

Until the great war began the admiralty adhered strictly to the practice of demoting commanders who lost their ships through negligence and never granting them another command. Captain Fitzherbert lost his vessel, the cruiser Bedford, by stranding on the Korean coast. He was court-martialed and dismissed. Later he was allowed to re-enter the navy as a superintendent of contract built ships. His success in this work re-established the admiralty's confidence in Fitzherbert and he is now in the high ranks of the service.

Rear Admiral Fitzherbert is a brother of Lord Stafford.

Arson Ring's Queen Is on Probation OAKLAND, Cal., Nov. 24.—Jeanne Burright, confessed queen of the Pacific coast arson ring, was granted probation by Judge Ogden for five years. Her husband, Lester, confessed accomplice, is awaiting trial.

SALEM, Ore., Nov. 24.—The agricultural department of the Salem Commercial club now has a hog market in full blast. Since the first of the month over five carloads of hogs have been purchased. The establishment of the hog market is in line with the policy of the Commercial club to find a market for all products of farmers.

NEW YORK, Nov. 25.—Mrs. Juliana Heath, president and founder of the National Housewives League, says the officials of the league will welcome the closest investigations of their methods, by members of the New Jersey branch of the League, who have demanded an investigation by the attorney general of New York.

According to the Jersey insurgents the row started early, in September, when the members received a letter on the official stationery of the league, signed by Mrs. Heath, endorsing a certain brand of soap and enclosing a reprint of a page "ad" in the "Housewives' League Magazine," the official organ of the national body.

These letters set the members wondering how such endorsements were obtained. It is alleged that manufacturers of food products were compelled to buy advertising space in the magazine before the league officials would consent to test the products.

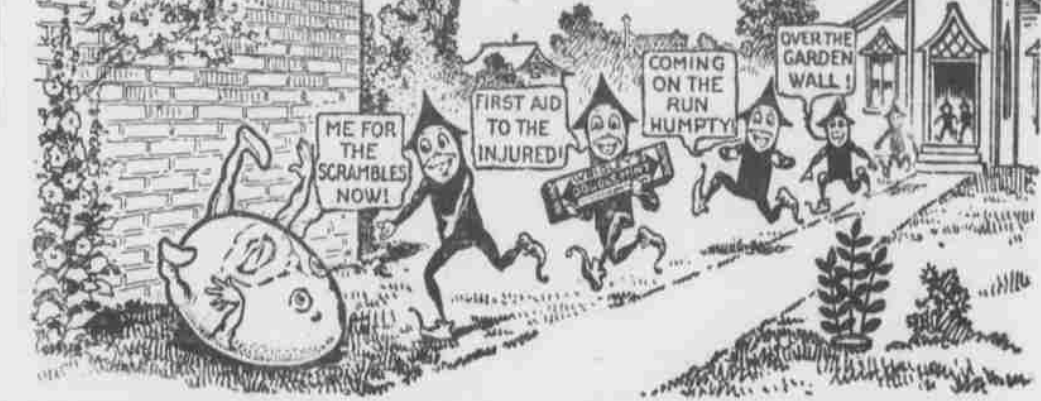

It is said that American trade with Greenland is confined to the import of cryolite from that frigid region, which furnishes for the making of the opaque glass for enameling iron-ware. In 1910 our imports of cryolite amounted to 36 tons, valued at \$65 a ton, and for the year ending June 30, 1915, the imports were 4,565 tons, worth \$29 a ton. Isn't it an outrage that we have

no deposits of cryolite in this country? Our lack of such deposits is evidently due to the "democratic free trade law." With sufficient protection to encourage it, Nature would undoubtedly get busy and create American deposits of cryolite "under the flag." Philanthropic Americans would discover the deposits and develop them—thus giving work to American labor at "the American standard of wages." That would increase the cost of enameled ware.

Greece Orders Ships Home. LONDON, Nov. 24.—Greece has ordered all Greek merchantmen to leave French and Italian ports immediately, according to an Exchange Telegraph dispatch received here from Copenhagen.
