#### BECKETT IS ELECTED U. OF O. FOOTBALL CHIEF

#### PORTLAND MAN IS CHOSEN CAPTAIN OF NEXT UNIVERSITY SQUAD

UNIVERSITY OF OREGON, Eugene, Nov. 29.—John O. Beckett of Portland, a junior in college, has been elected to lead the next University of Oregon football campaign. Beckett's election was an event of this afternoon when letter-winners of the 1915 squad met to choose a captain.

Oregon's captain-elect began to play football in the back lots of Portland as far back as 1908; he was then a center on the old Third Church eleven. The following season he entered Washington high school and at once fought his way to a regular place on Coach Earl's aggregation. The ensuing fall Beckett captained the Washington machine and in 1912 played his last game of football in the Portland interscholastic league.

Beckett entered Oregon in 1913 and as a freshman made the varsity. Since then he has starred and at the close of this successful lemon-yellow campaign Johnny was mentioned as all-American timber.

Beckett is the son of J. W. Beckett, of Portland, and is a member of the Sigma Nu fraternity.

#### TWO INSANE IN CHURCH

#### Man and Wife, Brooding Over War, Break Up Gathering.

YONKERS, N. Y., Nov. 29.—Brooding over the lack of sympathy in this country for the cause of the Teutonic allies, Willy G. Holdorf, until recently chief chemist for the Strohman Sugar Refinery, and his wife, Frieda, both became violently insane here while attending services in St. John's Evangelical Lutheran church.

Amid screams of terror from 500 men members of the congregation, who climbed into pews or fled through the doorways, the couple was finally overpowered, after Mrs. Holdorf had torn most of her clothes from her. She cried out that she was commissioned by God to end all wars and made repeated attempts to reach the pulpit, that she might preach. Her husband's utterances were unintelligible, but he fought violently and half a dozen men held him until Leone Sprackel, until lately his superior at the Strohman refinery, arrived and calmed him.

#### WOMAN BURGLAR IS BUSY

#### Clothing Taken From Cleaning Shop by Expert Blindfold.

PORTLAND, Ore., Nov. 29.—Portland's woman burglar renewed her operations by taking a shirt and a woman's coat from a cleaning shop operated by Max Epstein at 272 Columbia street. She left no trace of her identity. The woman is believed to have been collecting money and jewelry in the city for a year. She has been traced by the articles of feminine attire taken.

The only show the police have against her is a dainty footstool she left on a dusty floor in an empty furnished house on North Sixteenth street.

#### FRENCH CASH POURING IN

#### "Victory Loan" Said to Have Met With Favor of Neutrals, Also.

PARIS, Nov. 29.—Dispatches received by the ministry of finance from places throughout France indicate the growing success of the "victory loan." Throughout the day the banks of the province and the post-offices were crowded with subscribers, while in Paris there was no diminution of the eagerness of the public to participate.
