## GLASSES TO BE STERILIZED

Ohio Board of Health Takes Action Against Soda Fountains  
COLUMBUS, Ore., Nov. 30.—"Percent sodas" universally in Ohio may be a result of the state board of health's latest ruling that all glasses, spoons and dishes used at soda fountains must be sterilized in boiling water.

Several confectioners and soda fountain proprietors declared they could not continue to sell "sodas," "dopes" and frozen dainties at 5 cents if they are compelled to install sterilizing equipment.

## GOETHALS NEEDS NO MEN

Slides Do Not Warrant Influx of Labor to Isthmus  
WASHINGTON, Nov. 30.—Blocking of the Panama canal by earth slides has not created new work for Americans in the canal zone and the canal office here issued a statement in an effort to counteract published reports.

"General Goethals indicates," the statement says, "that the number of men continually being laid off on account of reduction of force is in excess of the vacancies which were temporarily created by the work of the slides and the influx of men looking for employment on the isthmus is entirely unwarranted."

LONDON, Nov. 30.—A dispatch to the Daily Mail from Rotterdam says: "One of Germany's newest dreadnaughts struck a mine in the Baltic sea and went to the bottom. All the members of the crew were saved except 25, who were drowned."

The battle will be a sort of preliminary to a meeting with Freddie Welsh, the present title holder. Both Dundee and Wells have challenged Welsh and the bout here is expected to eliminate the claims of one or the other.

## GIRL STEALS TO GO HOME

Finance Leaves Her and Shopping Is Last Resort  
PHILADELPHIA, Dec. 1.—That she resorted to shoplifting to obtain money to pay her fare back to her home in Los Angeles after her sweetheart abandoned her in this city, was the story told by Nina Peters, following her arrest in a store.

Detectives visited the girl's room in Arch street, near Broad, and recovered about \$500 worth of goods which had been taken from department stores.

According to the young woman's story she came to Philadelphia last May to marry a young man whom she had known from childhood. They quarreled, she said, and the young man abandoned her. She refused to divulge his name.

"I walked the streets for days," she said, "looking for work, but could find none. Finally, when I was nearly dead from hunger, a woman took me in and cared for me. When I had recovered my strength this woman suggested that I follow her line. She was a professional shoplifter and she taught me how to steal. I wanted to get back home and that seemed to be the quickest way to get money for my cartage."

The girl refused to give the name of the woman to the police.

## ASTOR'S WALLET STOLEN

Millionaire Is Jostled in Crowd and Valuable Taken  
NEW YORK, Dec. 1.—After Vincent Astor had dined at the Waldorf-Astoria, he was arrested as a pickpocket. Mr. Astor looked him over and decided he was not the man who stole his wallet as he stood with his wife and friends in front of the Belasco theater waiting for his automobile.

The arrest of Weinstein brought to light the theft, which the police had kept secret. Mr. Astor called on Inspector Schmittberger at police headquarters. He looked over the picture of Weinstein as that of the man who had jostled him and then impressed the party by the profusion of his apologies. Mr. Astor when he reached home missed the wallet, which contained a sum of money and valuable papers. Weinstein was arrested and appeared in the West Side court.

Mr. Astor got a glimpse of the suspect before the case was called and when he was unable to identify him did not appear as complainant. Magistrate Cobb discharged Weinstein.
