NEWS OF PENDLETON

Son Is Born.

Grip Interferes With Work.

The epidemic of la grippe which is prevalent in the city and county is interfering with the rapid progress of work on the Pilot Rock junction terminals. Many of the men have been affected with the disease owing to their exposure and hardly a day passes that a physician is not called to attend one or more of them.

Postal Business Gains.

The report of the local postoffice for the month of November shows the business made a healthy gain over November last year. The receipts for November, 1915, were \$2435.93 and for November, 1914, \$1873.71, the increase being \$461.22. The postal savings deposits now are \$2978, whereas one year ago they were \$3345.

Telephone Team Again Wins.

In the commercial bowling league the telephone team again came off a victor over the High Fives last night by a total score of 2452 against 2268. Both teams rolled under form. Four Boxcars for Russia.

Another trainload of knocked down boxcars, consigned to the Siberian railway, passed through Pendleton this morning enroute to Seattle for shipment across the Pacific. This is the third or fourth such shipment which has passed through the city.

Brings Back Prisoner.

Deputy Sheriff J. H. Estes arrived home last evening from Eugene, having in his custody H. H. Williams who was arrested there upon information furnished by Sheriff Taylor. Williams was indicted here several years ago on a charge of larceny by bailer and has been a fugitive since.

Land Contest Being Tried.

In the circuit court this afternoon the case of George Prospek and the heirs of Orlene Bishop vs. Marvin Dyer is being tried. Defendant has a title to a piece of land in the east end of the county and the plaintiffs are contesting the title. Carter and Morrison are attorneys for the plaintiff and Peterson and Bishop for the defendant.

Ask for County Aid.

Two delegations waited upon the county court this morning soon after the December session opened and both asked for county aid in the graveling of roads. One delegation was from Stanfield and agreed to furnish 50 per cent of the labor for graveling the road east of Stanfield to connect with the Stage Gulch road. The other delegation made a similar promise relative to the Cayuse road. No action was taken, the court taking the petitions under advisement.

Mrs. Dagget Wants Divorce.

Mrs. Mary Dagget today filed suit in the circuit court against her husband, Almiron Dagget, asking for a divorce, for the custody of two minor children, for expense money and for \$20 per month permanent alimony. The couple were married at Darton, Wash., in January, 1904. Plaintiff alleges that her husband is addicted to the use of liquor, has forced her to support herself and family, has abused her and handled her roughly and in other ways has been cruel to her. HIGH SCHOOL LAW TO BE TESTED AT BAKER

BAKER, Ore., Dec. 1.—M. D. Clifford, representing the Baker school board, is preparing mandamus proceedings against County Judge Messick and County Commissioners Ritter and Welch to compel the county court to levy a tax on the non-high school districts of the county to pay the tuition of students from those districts attending high school in other districts.

The action is being taken as the result of a decision made by the school board to test the new law.

WHEAT LAND NEAR COVE BOUGHT FOR \$16,000

TRACT OF 220 ACRES CHANGES HANDS — BIGGEST CASH DEAL IN MONTHS.

LA GRANDE, Ore., Dec. 1.—Sixteen thousand dollars cash was paid by A. B. Conley for 220 acres of wheat land adjoining his several thousand acre holding near Cove. Walter Ross was the seller. This was one of the largest cash deals in recent months in this valley.

BRYAN TO JOIN FORD PEACE PARTY ABROAD

WILL MEET DELEGATES IN EUROPE AS HE APPROVES OF THE IDEA.

MIAMI, Fla., Dec. 1.—William J. Bryan announced that he would not sail on the Ford peace ship December 4, but would join the party later in Europe, as he approved heartily of Ford's plan.

Bank Robbers Got Big Haul. MUSKOGEE, Okla., Dec. 1.—The Farmers National bank at Fort Gibson, eight miles from Muskogee, was held up and robbed of several thousand dollars by four bandits, three white men and a negro. The bandits locked the cashier and bookkeeper in the vault before looting the bank. The negro was posted outside on guard. The robbers escaped on horseback.

QUESTION OF PROSECUTING SHEEP THIEVES TO COME UP

MATTER WILL BE ONE OF SUBJECTS DISCUSSED AT MEETING HERE.

Detection and prosecution of sheep thieves will be one of the policies urged at the coming convention of the Oregon Woolgrowers' Association in this city Friday and Saturday, according to a statement issued to the members of the association by John G. Hoke, secretary.

Complaints are being constantly lodged with the officers of the association, that shipments of sheep to the east and western points arrive at their destination short of the number originally billed out.

Secretary Hoke is expected to arrive in Pendleton tomorrow to make final preparations for the convention. The program has not yet been definitely arranged although practically all of the speakers have been secured. The program will cover almost every matter of interest to the grower of sheep.

The convention will be held in the Commercial association rooms and these rooms will be the headquarters of the woolmen during their stay here. Entertainment of the flockmasters is being provided for by the association.

CONVICT GETS AWAY IN FOG FROM PRISON FARM

MAN MAKES HIS ESCAPE AT WALLA WALLA—BLOOD-HOUNDS ON TRAIL.

WALLA WALLA, Wash., Dec. 1.—The heavy fog which overhung the valley was welcomed by one man, Ed Vandiver, a convict doing one to 14 years for burglary here, and sent up in 1908.

He took advantage of the mist and vanished from the prison farm where he has been working. Vandiver was gone an hour and 20 minutes before the guard missed him. The prison hounds led the guards and deputy sheriffs south of the city toward the state line, where up to late he had not been found.

MILITARISM FIGHT URGED.
Toronto Editor Declares After War is Time to Strike.
KANSAS CITY, Mo., Dec. 1.—"Militarism must be smashed, and after the war is over, a new internationalism must supplant the 'armed peace' that existed so long in Europe," Dr. J. A. Macdonald, editor of the Toronto Globe, told members of the City Club. "We must strike for international trust and good feeling." He declared such a spirit is best exemplified by the 4000 miles of bound-

ary line, unguarded on either side between United States and Canada. "It will be the mission of the United States, after the war, to lay before the world the example of international morality," said Mr. Macdonald.
