The holiday season is approaching which is observed by all nations in some form. It is the time for all to share their comforts and luxuries of life. How true this quotation, "Not what we give, but what we share, for the gift without the giver is bare."

Christmas Dinner Menu.

COMMERCIAL PREPAREDNESS.

(Boston Post) Coincident with the nation-wide agitation for military preparedness, the necessity for which the European war has brought home to us, an equally insistent demand has arisen from certain quarters for preparedness against a commercial invasion.

KOPRIIL.

Koprili, which has been the vortex of the rapid battles fought in southern Serbia between the Bulgarians and the Serbians, French and English allies, is described as follows in the latest sketch on war geography issued by the National Geographic Society:

"Koprili dominates the Vardar river valley and guards the way to Monastir, the last Serbian city and stronghold. It is situated on the upper-middle part of the Vardar's course, in a whorl of rugged mountains. The Salonika-Mitrovia railway, passes through the town, and with a short branch line from Salonika through Volens to Monastir, forms the only means of rail communication with the outside world remaining to Serbia. Koprili is thus a tower of great strategic importance; for its possession by the allies keeps the way open for a reconquest of them of Serbia.

"The valley in which the city lies is a narrow one, and on every side for miles around stretch broken mountain lines. The roads through this region are little more than miserable tracks through forest tangles and over rockstrewn hillsides. The best way in this country follows the river's course, parallel with the railway, from Uskup, 25 miles northwest of Koprili to Karasuli, across the boundary in Grecian Macedonia.

"Serbia acquired possession of Koprili after the war of the Balkan League against the Ottoman empire in 1912. Before the transfer of the city's allegiance it was a hotbed of Serbian, Bulgarian and Grecian nationalist propaganda. The city had a population of about 24,000 at the outbreak of the war and was developing a brisk trade in silk, mulberries and corn were the chief products of the valley around, and commerce in these articles brought Koprili most of its income."

Sec. 2130, Lord's Oregon Laws—Importing voters a felony—Any person who shall by promise of favor or reward or otherwise induce or persuade a person to come in to this state or into any county or precinct in the state for the purpose and with the intent that such person shall by so changing his habitation, vote at any election which may be held in this state, at any place where any such voter or person is not a bona fide resident shall be deemed guilty of a felony and upon conviction thereof shall be punished as hereinafter provided.

Who to Vote.

To be a qualified elector a person must be 21 years old or more, must have lived in the state at least six months and in the city ninety days and, if a foreigner, must have been naturalized.
