## JUDGEMENT REVERSED FOR DAMAGES IN THE CASE OF JOHN SPAIN

STATE SUPREME COURT HOLDS CERTAIN TESTIMONY NOT PERMISSIBLE.

SALEM, Ore., Dec. 7.—Justice McBride reversed the judgment for damages for John Spain against the Oregon-Washington Railway and Navigation company. He held the circuit court should not have permitted evidence regarding the effect of imprudence in the alleged filthy Huntington jail, on the stump of Spain's arm which recently was amputated. Spain was taken from a train to jail because the conductor believed he had been drinking.

## To Act as Partners.

"There was a time when the United States looked upon itself as in some sort the guardian of the republic to the south of her," said the president. "Every thoughtful man of America must welcome the altered circumstances of the new days in whose light we now stand, when there is no claim of guardianship or thought of wards, but instead a full and honorable association as partners in the interest of all America. We still mean always to make a common cause of national independence and political liberty in America. But that purpose is now better understood."

"Our Mexican affairs as an example of the new doctrine, the president continued.

"Her fortunes are in her own hands. But at least we have proved that we will not take advantage of her in her distress and undertake to impress upon her a government of our own choosing. We will aid and defend Mexico, but we will not enforce her; and our course ought to be sufficient proof to all America that we seek no sovereignty or selfish control."

"The moral is that the states of America are not hostile rivals but cooperating friends, and that their growing sense of community of interest, alike in matters political and in matters economic, unlikely to give them a new significance as factors in international affairs and in the political history of the world. It presents them as in a very deep and true sense, a unit in world affairs, spiritual partners, standing together because thinking together, quick with common sympathies and common ideals. Separated, they are subject to all the cross-currents of the confused politics of a world of hostile rivalries; united in spirit and purpose they cannot be disappointed of their peaceful destiny."

## KING WINS CONTEST AS THE DEMOCRATIC COMMITTEE DELEGATE

OREGON MAN SEATED—FIGHT GOES ON OVER CHOOSING CONVENTION CITY.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 7.—Will R. King was seated as Oregon's delegate to the democratic national committee, winning the contest with H. M. Easterly. Supporters of the various cities for the convention, presented claims throughout the day. The fight to oust McCombs failed to materialize.

Senator Phelan offered \$100,000 for the democratic national convention for San Francisco. Others backed him. Proponents of other cities pointed out the distance to the Pacific coast, St. Louis, Chicago and Dallas, continued in the fight. St. Louis pointed to the democratic convention there as an aid in swinging Missouri to the democrats.

## MYSTERY SURROUNDS STEAMER MINNESOTA CRIPPLED OFF SHORE

SAN FRANCISCO, Dec. 7.—Marine men expressed the fear today that a fire was smoldering in the holds of the freighter Minnesota, while the mutinous crew prevented the captain from sending information ashore.

The Minnesota is believed wallowing in a crippled condition off the Lower California coast. Despite wireless efforts no word had been received at noon today.

commercial, or transportation—in a word, national adequacy.

Marshalling of the nation's resources, not for war, but to insure peace, in a union of the Americans to maintain, secure from European interference, American ideas and ideals, was the paramount thought pounded home by the president.

The address, of about 9000 words, was the longest ever made to congress by the president.

Scathing, scorching denunciation of hyphenated Americans "who preach and practice disloyalty," was a feature.

President's Recommendations.

Among the president's specific recommendations were:

Secretary of War Garrison's army reorganization war plan.

Secretary of the Navy Daniel's navy building program.

A naval advisory council of defense.

Laws to deal with foreign plots and conspirators.

Government ship purchase.

Increased taxes, without a bond issue.

Rural credits legislation.

Conservation measures.

Philippine and Porto Rican "independence."

Investigation of railroad regulation and future development.

In dedication of the new era of pan-Americanism and its bearing upon necessity for United States "self-sufficiency and security" the president graphically pictures the present and future effects of the war.

SECOND CONCERT OF TRIP THROUGH EASTERN OREGON TO BE GIVEN HERE.

UNIVERSITY OF OREGON, Eugene, Ore., Dec. 7.—The University of Oregon Glee Club leaves Portland December 27 on its annual tour of eastern Oregon. The second concert on the trip will be given at Pendleton on December 28.

Dean Ralph H. Lyman, of the University school of music, who directs the club, has been holding rehearsals of the club daily for over two months with the result that the present aggregation of warblers is one of the best ever turned out at the state university. Music critics who have attended concerts given already this year say that the club is as good as last year's club, if not better. Competition for places was unusually strong this year and several old men were unable to retain their places. Sixteen new faces will be seen when the club appears in its eastern Oregon concert.

The glee club possesses the distinction of having in its membership a Chinese, Ho-Sheng Huang, of Amoy, China, who is registered in the university as a sophomore. Huang sings popular American songs in his native tongue. He appears in Chinese dress. At all of the concerts given thus far, the diminutive oriental has been the greatest individual attraction.

"Five Minutes of College Life," by Albert Gillette, Robert Langley, Carl Nelson and Jack Dolph, is a sidelight on life in a college and is proving one of the features of the club's program.

Leslie O. Toose, student manager of the club, leaves in two weeks on an advance tour of eastern Oregon. Leslie Toose and Lamar Toose, who is with the Ford peace party, are twin brothers.

The club will give the following concerts in eastern Oregon: December 27, the Dalles, December 28, Pendleton, December 29, La Grande, December 30, Baker, December 31, Hood River.

On its trip through the eastern part of the state, the club will travel in a private car and will be accompanied by a special traveling agent of the O-W, R. & N.
