L. H. Jamieson and J. C. Martin were among the residents of Athena spending last night in the city.

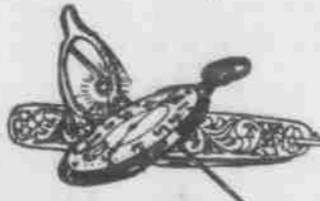
Mrs. E. Simmons of Portland, who has been visiting at the home of her brother, Dr. I. U. Temple, left on No. 17 today for her home.

Asylum Is Quarantined.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 10.—The Washington Asylum Hospital has been quarantined against diphtheria. Forty patients, including a physician and three nurses, are under treatment and orders have been issued to admit no more patients to the institution. The situation, however, it is believed, may clear up in time to permit of the revocation of the order by early next week.

Of the total number of patients under treatment only three have well developed cases, it is stated, while the remainder have what is known as "carrier" cases. These patients, it is explained, present no outward symptoms of diphtheria, but may be a source of infection to others.

It is believed the diphtheria epidemic has been checked, though it has been one of the most stubborn the department has had to deal with in recent years. A total of 115 cases has been reported to the department.
