Mrs. H. G. Newport was a Pendleton visitor Monday.

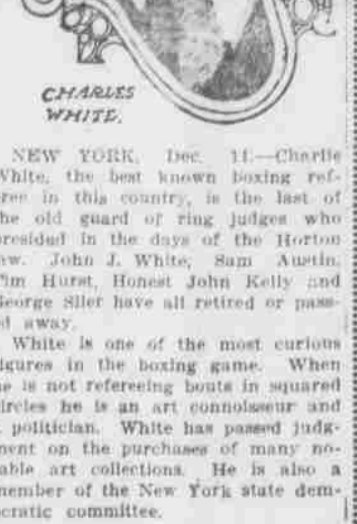
R. C. Waiger leaves Sunday for his former home in Cincinnati, where he will spend the holidays with relatives and friends.

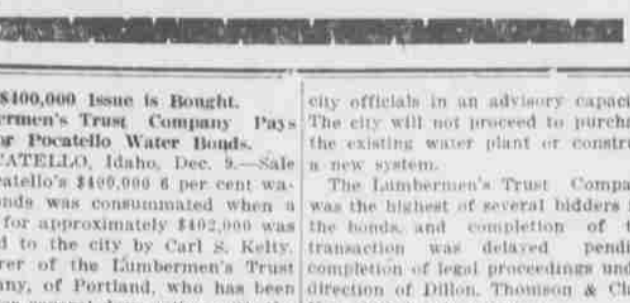
