### GRAIN FED STEERS IN PORTLAND YARDS REACH \$7.50 AGAIN

PORTLAND, Ore.—Cattle market showed a strong trend at North Portland during the day with sales of top steers again at the \$7 mark. Several carload lots were sold at the extreme figure with killers somewhat more interested in the general situation than formerly.

There was an extremely good tone in the cow market with a carload sold early in the day at \$5.60 for favorable quality.

Further decrease in offerings of cattle were shown at North Portland for the day and this was the big influence in forcing prices to a stronger point.

**BROADWAY HELPS HORSES.**  
Animals Fall into Hole and Public Aids With Advice.  
NEW YORK, Dec. 11.—Two horses hitched to a truck were standing between Fifty-fifth and Fifty-sixth streets in Seventh avenue the other night, lazily snuffing at the board railing surrounding an excavation 25 feet deep which they were facing. A trolley car came along and bumped the rear end of the truck off the track. At the same time the horses were shot forward and crashed through the board fence. With feet going like the blades of an electric fan in August they hung over the excavation. A gang of Italian workmen, working directly below looked up when they heard the snorts of terror. They vanished in an instant.

After five minutes of suspense, during which everybody yelled directions at everybody else, the traces broke. The horses landed on a pile of soft dirt below.

Meanwhile Broadway heard about the affair and came over to help give directions. Several policemen had all they could do to keep dozens of people from being shoved into the hole. Finally, after a free-for-all debate, several men were lowered into the excavation and blankets were wrapped around the horses' bodies. Then chains were attached to the blankets and a derrick was brought into play. The horses were pulled out unharmed.
