SNOW AT BAKER GLADDENS

Fall is Heaviest in Years and Mountains Are Stuffed Moisture.
BAKER, Ore., Dec. 15.—Averaging nearly one-tenth in moisture content, the heaviest December snow known here in years fell and weighed down trees and shrubs. Snow plows and shovels were busy.

Pioneers say this is the most severe early winter known for years, although it has been ideal Christmas weather. They say there is more snow piled in the mountains than there has been so early in the season for more than 25 years. Ranchers are happy, because it assures an extra amount of irrigation next season and an early spring with its consequent long growing season.

OFFICIAL ORGAN OF GAME COMMISSION ON A PAYING BASIS

OREGON SPORTSMAN OWES ITS SUCCESS TO EFFORTS OF STATE WARDEN.
New Subscribers to Number of 1136 on Lists of Paper—Finley Loses Bet of Dinner That the Thing Could Not be Done—The Whole Force Will be Dined.

The Oregon Sportsman, the official organ of the state fish and game commission, is on a paying basis now and thereby hangs a tale. To Warden Carl D. Shoemaker goes the credit and also a dinner for his whole force at the expense of Biologist W. L. Finley. The Oregonian tells the story as follows:

It all came about when the warden took over the Oregon Sportsman, the official state organ of the department,

some time ago. It had been dragging along indifferently in the "red," one of the luxuries that the taxpayers are paying for without particularly knowing it.

The fact is, it did not have enough paying subscribers to get in on the second-class entry privilege—the boon that every journal seeks, because it saves postage about fivefold. While the Oregon Sportsman is a quarterly publication, Warden Shoemaker being a publisher of a paper in Roseburg, had learned its value in saving the pennies.

"I'll get 1000 live ones by December 15," remarked the warden to the biologist. They were discussing the journal and how best to rejuvenate and galvanize it into a going, paying sheet.

"What? Impossible!" exclaimed Biologist Finley. "It can't be done. Why, you can't get the half of that."

"Bet a dinner," wagered the warden.

"You're on," accepted the biologist, and they shook hands.

The time was up yesterday, and when the warden counted up the new ones on the paying list there were just 1136, and enough coming in for the next three days under that date

to swell the number to 1500, according to the warden.

"You going to make him pay the bet?" he was asked.

"I should say I am. All of us are going to put our feet under the mahogany at one of the Portland hotels, and the check is going to Mr. Finley. I am going to break the news to him tomorrow, and maybe he won't be surprised."
