### PRINCIPALS IN WHITE SLAVE CASE MARRIED

SAN FRANCISCO, Dec. 20.—Mount I. Diggs and Marsha Warrington, two of the figures in the "white slave" case which caused a nation-wide sensation in 1913, were married in Oakland by Justice of the Peace James G. Quinn.

Diggs is now under sentence to serve five years in a federal prison for taking Marsha Warrington to Nevada in 1913 and living with her there. His case, as that of his chum, F. Drew Cammett, is now before the United States supreme court on review.

Diggs stole a march on all his friends. He had been working as an architect in Oakland for more than a year.

Immediately after the wedding Diggs and his bride left in an automobile for a two days' automobile trip. Diggs made this statement: "I think that Marsha Warrington is one of the sweetest girls that ever lived. I am sure we are going to be very happy. During my life I have built \$20,000,000 worth of buildings in this state, since my trouble, after locating here in Oakland, I have built up a nice little business and I see no reason why I cannot be as happy as other men are."
