 LONDON, Dec. 24.—David Lloyd George, minister of munitions, announced in the house of commons that the 22 national munition factories had saved the government \$100,000,000.

Mutiny Among Ales.
 BERLIN, Dec. 24.—Several general staff officers were reported killed in a mutiny of allied troops at the island of Imbros. Nearly all the forces at this island, Tenedos and Lemnos, bases for the Dardanelles operations, are said to have left there after discontent arose. The final quitting followed a promise for more reinforcements.

Tree Pins Man in Tree.
 YONKERS, N. Y., Dec. 24.—Pierre Baret, proprietor of the White House, an inn well known to motorists in Grassy Spain road, this city, was injured painfully when a tree which was being felled under his direction fell upon him as he was seated in the branches of another tree 20 feet distant, crushing one foot and severely bruising him about the body.
 Despite the efforts of firemen to remove him from his perilous position, he was kept a prisoner in the tree for three hours, unable to move hand or foot, so thickly was he wedged in by denuded branches. While the firemen were sawing off branches, brandy was supplied to Baret from his own cellar, and they managed to cover his foot with a blanket to prevent it from catching fire. He suffered intensely but he insisted his rescuers as far as possible by directing them which branches to cut, many of which threatened to pierce his body at his slightest movement.

BELGIAN COAST SHELLED. Allied Monitors Driven Off by German Land Batteries. BRISBAN, via London, Dec. 24.—British allied monitors shelled the German positions at Westende, on the Belgian coast, but were finally driven away by land batteries, says the official statement issued by German headquarters.
