Unatilla Couple to Wed.

A marriage license was issued today to Henry H. Hines, section foreman at Unatilla, and May W. Seidel of the same town.

Estate is Appraised.

W. W. Edmisten, W. G. Bogert and Earl Counts, appraisers of the estate of the late C. H. Brown, have submitted their report to the court, fixing the value of the estate at \$1729.82.

Phys. Way Out of Jail.

P. Howard, convicted yesterday of carrying concealed weapons, yesterday afternoon secured \$25, the amount of his fine, and paid his way out of jail. This is the second such fine he has paid for carrying this gun.

All three were this morning given five days in jail by Judge Fitz Gerald and their sentences will not expire until after the state has gone dry. The first mentioned has been drunk frequently of late and the last two were "vaxed."

Advance in Flour.

According to a dispatch from Portland this afternoon, the price on flour will advance 20 cents a barrel soon in the Portland market. This information, it was stated, was received from milling interests. The new price will be \$3.43. Whether this advance will affect the local market is unknown as no word has yet been received here.

Kicked on the leg by a horse a month ago, R. H. Beckham of Athena ever since has been suffering with the injury and yesterday came to Pendleton for an operation. Surgeons opened the leg and removed some superfluous bone and expect the leg to heal as a result.

Flour Mills Bring Suit.

The miller Flouring Mills of Unbou county has filed suit in the local court against John F. Temple, Jr., asking judgment for \$1819, alleged to be due on a note and for merchandise purchased. Robert S. Eakin, Jr. of La Grande and S. A. Lowell of this city are attorneys for the plaintiff.

Reading Course Is Prescribed.

County Superintendent L. E. Young calls attention to the fact that hereafter teachers in the state must have taken a prescribed reading circle course before their certificates can be filed for registration. There are nineteen books in the course, thirteen of which can be secured through the University of Oregon correspondence school and the other six from the O. A. C. extension department.

FAMILY LOST SIX YEARS.

Wife and Children Disappear When Husband Takes New Job.

PITTSBURG, Dec. 28.—Frank Skobowach, aged 35, told the officers in the Allegheny police station recently that, after wandering over four states for six years in an effort to locate his family, he believed his wife and two children were living in Pittsburg. He asked the police to aid him in his search.

Skobowach says he was working in South Sharon, but left six years ago to come here, where wages were better. He wrote to his wife to come on, but got no reply. He went to South Sharon only to find the house empty. Skobowach could get no trace of his family, but worked until he had \$4000, all of which he has spent in the hope of locating the wife and children. He is now penniless.

Workmen's Law Upheld.

SALEM, Ore., Dec. 28.—The supreme court upheld the workmen's compensation act. Justice McHride declared it would be a reflection on a republican form of government if the bill which passed the legislature, almost unanimously and was affirmed by popular vote, was allowed to be permeated with the rottenness of unconstitutionality.

Japanese Sailings Changed.

TOKYO, Dec. 28.—The Japanese mail liners are transferring sailings around the Cape of Good Hope. It is believed to be a result of the torpedoing of the Yawaka Maru.

7 PROVINCES IN REVOLT.

Chinese Military Leaders Active in Support of Rebellion.

SAN FRANCISCO, Dec. 28.—A cablegram received by Tung King (Chong, president of the Chinese Republic Association, from revolutionary leaders in Shanghai said that a total of seven provinces have declared themselves against the new Chinese monarchy.

In response to telegrams sent to military leaders in the provinces by the Shanghai headquarters, it was said the active support of the revolution was promised.

SKATING ACCIDENT FATAL.

Son of Harney County School Principal Drowned Near Burns.

BAKER, Ore., Dec. 28.—As the result of a skating accident on the Silver river, near Burns, Robert, the 12 year old son of Professor M. Shirk, principal of the Harney county school, is dead at his home there. The boy with three other lads, went to the river to skate and Shirk and a companion named Horton broke through the ice.

The Horton boy was rescued by his older brother, and while this rescue was being accomplished young Shirk was drowned.

SLAIN WOMAN'S SON FREE.

Andrew Kuchne Is Released After Long Examination.

KLAMATH FALLS, Dec. 28.—After a preliminary hearing, Andrew Kuchne, son of the woman slain in the Dodd Hollow feud was released from custody following his arrest in Merrill on charge of being armed with a dangerous weapon. Hearing was held before Justice of the Peace E. W. Brown, of this city. The charges were made by the alleged slayer of the boy's mother.

BOY-ED, SAILING FOR GERMANY, DENOUNCES AMERICAN PAPERS

SAYS TIME WILL COME WHEN GOVERNMENT WILL HAVE TO INTERFERE.

NEW YORK, Dec. 28.—Boy-ed, Colonel House and Brand Whitlock are sailing for Europe as shipmates today. House commented: "I hope the American press and public will not speculate further concerning the object of my trip. I repeat that the trip has nothing to do with peace proposals."

House said he first would visit Page at London, then Sharpe at Paris and Gerard at Berlin. He doubted if a conference would be had with Fielden at Vienna. Whitlock is returning to Brussels, improved after his sickness. Boy-ed was surrounded at the dock by a crowd of friends. He made a prepared statement, bitterly denouncing the newspapers. He predicted the time was coming when the government will be forced to suppress the "wild, reckless utterances of irresponsible papers."

FATAL SPAN DEFECTIVE.

Portland Expert Declares Steel in Spokane Bridge Was Poor.

SPOKANE, Wash., Dec. 28.—The most probable cause of the collapse of the Division-street bridge here in which five men were killed, was the breaking of the lower chord eye bars, due to poor material, according to a report made by John W. Cunningham of Portland, who examined the wreckage for the coroner. The report says the material was

inferior at the time the bridge was built in 1892 and its use would have been improbable under proper engineering inspection. After the erection, however, says the report, no reasonable inspection could have shown the cause of failure.

SWINDLE LAID TO THREE.

Woman and Men Accused of Pawn-ing Goods They Got on Credit.

ASTORIA, Ore., Dec. 28.—Mrs. W. H. Emerson and two young men who say they are her sons, Charles and Frank, were committed to the county jail to await the action of the circuit court grand jury on a charge of defrauding merchants. The trio had business cards showing they were engaged in the millinery and fur business here, and on the strength of

that procured merchandise on credit, which they disposed of at pawnshops. It is reported they worked a similar scheme at Colfax, Wash. Two small children who accompanied Mrs. Emerson were committed to the care of the Boys' and Girls' Aid Society in Portland.

\$265,000 Canadians Enlist. OTTAWA, Ont., Dec. 24.—The recruiting during the first 15 days of December amounted to 12,500 and the total since the outbreak of the war is now 295,000. This is about one in 29 of the total population.
