NEAR-BEER TOO NEAR; CAN'T GO IN SEATTLE

SEATTLE, Wash., Jan. 5.—"Lifestaff," a product manufactured by a local brewery as a substitute for the beer which prohibition banished, was declared a malt liquor by prosecuting Attorney A. H. Lundin, who announced that attempts to sell the product in this county would be followed by prosecutions.

Lundin's action is based upon reports of three chemists who examined the beverage. Although the chemists reported that "Lifestaff" contained no alcohol the prosecutor decided that it is a malt liquor and cannot therefore be sold legally in Washington.

The prosecutor also called attention in a public statement today to advertisements of liquor printed in magazines published outside the state. Lundin holds that all advertisements of this character must be deleted by news dealers before the periodicals may be offered for sale.

GERMAN PEACE PLANS DECLARED MONSTROUS

PARIS, Jan. 5.—A Zurich newspaper has published an article purporting to outline Germany's latest peace terms. It is asserted here that this article was supplied by Prince von Buelow. The alleged peace terms are:

All occupied territories to be evacuated. France to cede the mineral deposits in the Briey valley and transfer to the German treasury the £1,600,000,000 of Russian government securities which she holds. Belgium to retain her independence under a ruling German sovereign and pay Germany annually the sum which she has hitherto expended on armaments.

Poland to be reconstructed under a German king. The French newspapers say that the terms are monstrous.

The French are reported to have stationed parrots on the Eiffel Tower to give warning against approach of aeroplanes. The birds chirped and screech when the machines approached long before they are detected by human lookouts.

Pendleton Man is Sued. LA GRANDE, Ore., Jan. 5.—Action to recover about \$10,000 has been started here by Thomas Morgan against James S. Johns of Pendleton. Mr. Morgan contends that Mr. Johns unlawfully holds certificates of stock in the Union County Farm Company to that amount.
