RABBIT POISONING TO BE PLAN AT BAKER

COMMERCIAL CLUB TAKES ACTION TO EXTERMINATE NUMEROUS PESTS.

BAKER, Ore., Jan. 12.—Starting a big cooperative movement of the organizations of the county to eliminate jackrabbits, the Baker Commercial club and Baker County Farmers Union will begin the apportioning of poison at the Keating Grange Hall.

The plan is to have every rancher spread poison, which is compiled according to a government formula, on his ranch, and when the movement is spread to all parts of the county the extermination will be thorough. Walter Meacham, secretary of the Commercial Club, and Henry McKinnay, president of the Farmers Union, will have charge of the distribution.

WHY NOT NAME THE FARM AND HAVE A LETTERHEAD?

IF PAYS, Says Dean Morton, and it Pays to Advertise, Too, When There's Farm Stuff to Sell.

The Oregon farmer can swell his annual receipts by using good printing and by occasional advertising in the weeklies of his county, says D. W. Morton, dean of the new school of commerce of the University of Oregon.

A farm letterhead should carry the name of the farm, the name of the owner, the location of the farm, and perhaps a small picture of some feature of the place, says Dean Morton who regards the farmer as a business man with a substantial investment upon which he should make every effort to pay interest.

"It gives a farmer a certain business standing if he has a neat letterhead of good stock, and it improves the value of his farm to have a name and something of an individuality," he said. "There is some initial expense in having a picture taken and a cut made, but the publisher of the nearest country paper will attend to the details and afterwards will do the printing reasonably."

"If the farmer raises highbush animals, his letterhead may contain a picture of a prize animal with its record; or if he has a stock farm, a picture of a bunch of stock; or if he has the best house or barn in the neighborhood, a picture of that; or a picture of a grove or a stream is usually effective on stationery. There are few Oregon farms not worth naming, and few that do not provide something worth a permanent picture."

"Advertising rates are very low in Oregon country papers, and a farmer at a cost of from 10 to 50 cents may

often sell a horse, a second-hand machine, of some other thing about the place he does not need by putting a small advertisement in his weekly paper.

"A farmer's advertising should of course conform to the best advertising standards; it should be very definite and absolutely truthful."

5000 Rose slips on Hand.
UNIVERSITY OF OREGON, Eugene, Jan. 12.—Five thousand Frau Karl Druschki rose slips, set out last summer and now well rooted, await the call of the public and private high schools of Oregon. Upon request a reasonable number will be sent free to each.

Last year 2500 slips were sent out to schools in lots averaging about 25. Requests numbered about 125, nearly all from high schools. The University has no objection to second requests from schools that secured slips in 1915, since the offer probably will be made annually so that schools may build up permanent Frau Karl Druschki hedges.

Last year's slips grew in almost every instance.

GRIP SERUM PREDICTED

Colonel Gorgas, at Banquet Honoring Him, Forecasts Cure.

CHICAGO, Jan. 12.—Major-General William C. Gorgas, who won a successful war against the yellow fever scourge in Panama, was presented with the gold medal of the Geographic Society of Chicago for his distinguished service to humanity. The gold medal has been bestowed on only two other men—Captain Amundsen, who reached the South Pole, and Major-General Goethals, builder of the Panama canal.

General Gorgas declared that the

elimination of poverty would be a long step toward the prevention of disease. He closed by giving several "healthgrams" for the prevention of grippe. His admonitions were: "Abate the smoke nuisance; let the sunshine in." "Educate the people to know what the germ is." "Shun contact with anyone and everyone who is a victim of the grippe and get as much fresh air exercise as you can."



The general said he thought that science would soon find a serum that would prove a preventive of grippe.

KING PETER STILL HOPES.

PARIS, Jan. 12.—King Peter of Serbia, who is still in Saloniki, is full of confidence, according to the Serbian minister to Greece, who has just returned from Saloniki, says a Havy dispatch from Athens. The king is waiting patiently for the completion of the reorganization

of the Serbian army, the dispatch adds, "so that he may put himself at its head."

Bar Has Disappeared.

PORTLAND, Ore., Jan. 1.—The bar at the mouth of the Columbia river has disappeared, government engineers reported after the annual survey. The water is now 35 feet deep for fifteen hundred feet, despite the heavy storms.
