1916 POSTAL TRADE GAINS.
Increase of \$10,812 Indicated Over Same Period Last Year.

PORTLAND, Ore., Jan. 12.—The Portland postoffice is beginning 1916 right with a big increase in business over that done at this time last year.

Postmaster Myers announced that receipts for the first 11 days of 1916 are nearly 28 per cent in excess of those for the first 11 days of 1915.

For the 11 days of this year ending last night, receipts totaled \$58,194.68 as compared to \$58,794.27 in the same period last year. This is a net gain of \$10,922.22.
