ECHO PEOPLE DOING ALL WITHIN POWER TO SAVE PHEASANTS

BIRDS COME BOLDLY INTO THE CITY TO ROOST IN THE TREES.

Cold Weather Causes Much Suffering Also Among Quail—Deputy Game Warden is Putting Out Grain for Birds—Residents Are Also Helping Feed Them.

ECHO, Ore., Jan. 19.—The China pheasants as well as the quail which have been liberated here during the past two years are experiencing some hardships this winter on account of the unusual severe weather. They will come boldly into town and roost in the trees. As many as sixteen pheasants were counted in one tree alone. Every thing is being done that is possible to protect and feed them.

C. B. Green, deputy game warden of this place is putting out wheat in various places where the birds congregate, besides many farmers are feeding them. It is a common sight to see the smaller birds eating from a bare spot in the back yards here where the snow has been cleared away by residents.

NEAR-BY TOWNS IN PATH OF THE COLD WAVE SUFFER ALSO

PENDELTON NOT ALONE WHEN IT COMES TO MERCURY GOING BELOW ZERO.

Walla Walla. WALLA WALLA, Wash., Jan. 18.—Last night's low temperature was a duplicate of that of the night before, seven below. The clear skies indicate more cold weather. Many business houses were without water this morning because of frozen pipes and many residences were also shut off. A canvass of plumbers today showed over 1000 calls to thaw frozen pipes since January 1.

Frozen pipes in the Russell home, 544 Alvarado Terrace, caused an explosion when the fire was lighted in the kitchen range. The stove was wrecked and two members of the family hurt. Several other ranges blew up, but no one was hurt.

La Grande. LA GRANDE, Ore., Jan. 18.—Sunday was the coldest day, save on two other occasions, during the 15 years government records have been kept here. The maximum rise yesterday was 15 above zero. In 1910 and 1902 records of 10 and 11, respectively, were registered. Last night's mark of seven below was a low mark for five years in this city. Traffic is moving slowly. Plumbers are swamped with rush orders.

Other nearby mercury slumps last night were, Enterprise 22; North Powder 22; Union 19; Wallowa 14; Kamela 12; Cove 11; Elgin 22; and Summerville 22, all below zero.

The Dalles. THE DALLES, Ore., Jan. 18.—This city is experiencing one of the coldest spells in its history, the mercury having dropped to 17 below last night. The maximum temperature this afternoon was 4 above. During 43 years, the period for which an official record has been kept, The Dalles

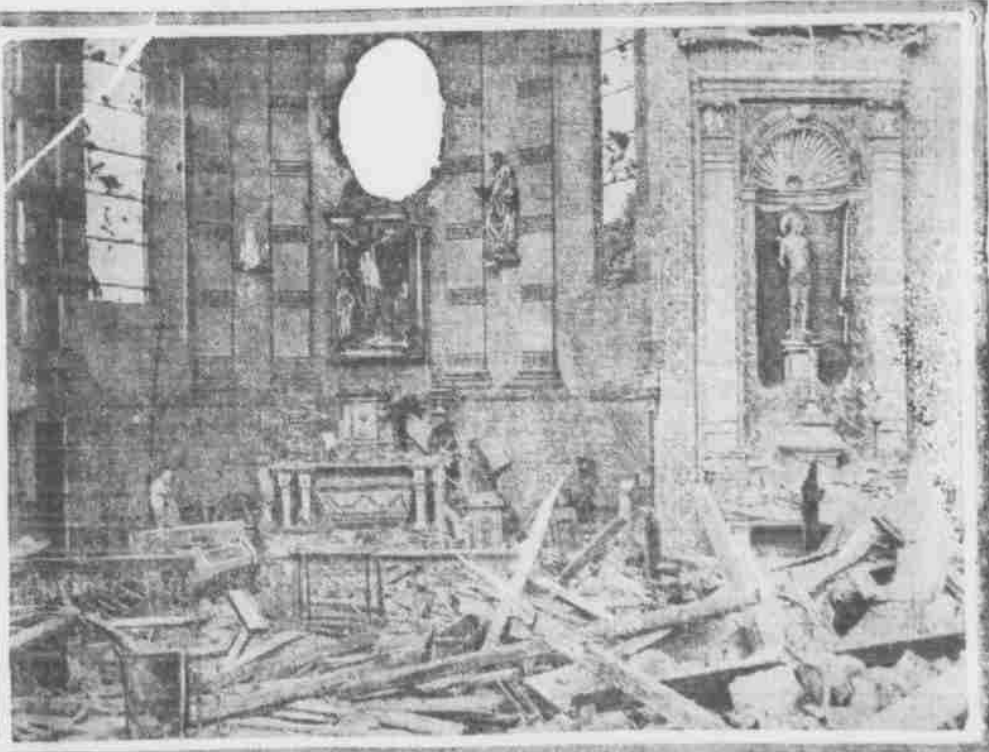
