### GREECE IS SAID TO HAVE REJECTED THE DEMANDS OF ALLIES

ULTIMATUM EXPIRES WITH NO CONCESSIONS ON PART OF CONSTANTINE.

LONDON, Jan. 21.—King Constantine has rejected the allied demands for the expulsion of Teutonic diplomats, German advisers, said the Tagblatt, however, asserted the allies had not delivered the ultimatum. The Vossische Zeitung declared lack of information was due to the Athens censorship. It reiterated that the ultimatum expired on Wednesday and had been rejected.

### STORM IN HAWAIIAN ISLANDS KILLS SEVEN

HONOLULU, Jan. 21.—Seven lives lost, a number of persons missing and heavy property loss are the results of a violent storm which has raged over the Hawaiian islands for the past week.

The island of Maui suffered most, seven bodies being recovered on Maui alone.

Rainfall here for 15 days of January totals 15 inches.

### BRINGING LIQUOR TO DANCE IS STRICTLY PROHIBITED

ALL SUBSEQUENT GRAND JURYS WILL BE ADVISED ON THIS POINT.

Whether or not the new city dance regulating ordinance is adopted as drafted, it will be unlawful for any one to carry liquor to a dance, the state prohibition law specifying that liquor shall not be served at a dance and that no one shall bring liquor to such an affair. Judge Phelps so instructed the grand jury now in session and states that he will advise every subsequent grand jury of the same provision.

The ordinance as presented at the council last Wednesday evening has provoked no end of discussion and the ordinance committee will probably look into the provisions thereof shortly before reporting upon it. The general sentiment seems to be that the main provisions of the ordinance are right but that some of the provisions are too drastic.

Lodges are objecting to the provision that requires all dances to stop at midnight, declaring some of their informal dances do not start until 10:30 or 11. High school students find objection to that provision prohibiting all persons under 18 years from attending dances unless accompanied by their parents or legal guardians. Others object to the attempts made to regulate private parties declaring the city is exceeding its authority. The placing of a ban upon suggestive dances seems to find the most favor.

### W. J. SUTTON IS CANDIDATE

Cheney Legislator's Gubernatorial Campaign Launched.

SPOKANE, Wash., Jan. 21.—Spokane and eastern Washington republicans of varying degrees of influence met to formally launch the campaign of Senator W. J. Sutton, of Cheney, long a member of the state legislature from this county, as a candidate for governor.

The action here marks the first organized republican movement to capture gubernatorial honors from Governor Lister, who is expected to be the democratic standard bearer.

As arranged at the meeting the formal announcement of Senator Sutton will be made in Spokane at a mass meeting of republicans to be called for January 31.

The event will be held in the Fine Arts building, and representative republicans from eastern Washington, as far west as North Yakima and Wenatchee and south to Walla Walla will be present.

### PASSION PLAY TO BE EXPLAINED AT CHRISTIAN CHURCH

TALKS BY LOCAL MEMBERS FEATURED REVIVAL SERVICE LAST EVENING.

The services last night at the First Christian church were of a slightly different nature than the regular evangelistic services have been. There was an unusually attractive song service to begin with, then followed a series of short talks by the following members.

Mr. Wm. Milne gave a short talk on behalf of the officers of the church. Mr. E. O. Draper, on behalf of the Bible school; Harvey McPherson, for the Endeavor Society; Mrs. Ida Olcott for the Ladies Aid Society; Mrs. H. H. Hubbell for the Christian Woman's Board of Missions; M. L. Peters for the choir and musical interests of the church.

These talks were interspersed by musical selections as follows: One song by the male quartet; duet by the Misses Chenutt and Parriner; and solos by Miss Nettie Anibal, Mrs. Ruth Overton and Mr. Ridenour.

Mr. Hubbell then followed with a short exhortation and a closing service whereby the new members were all given recognition by the older members of the church.

Tonight Mr. Ridenour, who has been the only outside force assisting in these meetings will conclude his work in the city, with an illustrated lecture on the famous Oberammergau Passion Play. The peasants in this far away hamlet in the Alps mountains have been giving their world renowned passion tragedy for nearly three hundred years.

The play is only given every ten years and the pictures which will be given tonight were made by the official photographer living in the village during the last performance, which was in 1910. During that year they gave 25 different performances.

Anton Lang, who played the part of Christ in 1906 and also in 1910 has been reported killed in the great European war now in progress, and it is said that his death is more universally mourned than has been the death of any other single individual during the war.

All of the proceeds of this lecture will go to the benefit of the local church. Mr. Ridenour will leave Saturday morning to begin a series of meetings at Dayton, Washington, immediately.
