ception of cattle, the entire livestock
market at North Portland was firm-
er and higher for the day.
There was an excellent run of swine
in the yards overnight. Market

ures.

son to date and is 2c above the high

COMMISSION IS ENJOINED.
Southern Pacific in Federal Court to Fight Connection Order.
SALEM, Ore., Jan. 22.—The Public Service Commission was notified that the Southern Pacific company had appealed to the United States district court at Portland from the commissioner's order that physical connection between the tracks of the Southern Pacific and Oregon Electric railway be made at Albany. Judge Wolverton granted a temporary injunction until the case can be heard. The court set January 24 as the time for hearing.

The Southern Pacific asks that the injunction against enforcement of the commission's order be made permanent, alleging that no public necessity for making a physical connection exists at Albany. Albany shippers testified before the commission to the need of such connection.
