BOY IS FOUND DEAD IN SNOW, BULLET IN BODY

PORTLAND, Ore., Jan. 26.—Walter H. Harris, Jr., student of Washington high school and member of the Oregon naval militia, was found dead on the sidewalk at Eighth and Siskiyou streets.

M. B. Barrett, who lives in this neighborhood, stumbled onto the body, which was covered with snow. Investigation by Detectives Swenson and Boyle led to the conclusion that Harris was the victim of the accidental discharge of a 32 caliber automatic revolver.

Young Harris was the son of Mr. and Mrs. Walter H. Harris of 637 East Edgely street north. He was one of the high school students who recently responded to the invitation to enlist in the naval militia.

Monday afternoon he borrowed the revolver from a boy friend for the purpose of taking it to drill. He showed it to his mother and was warned of the danger of handling it. Late Monday afternoon Walter left home and when he failed to return after drill, the parents made inquiries at the police station and at the hospital.

Leaving home the boy was attired in his sailor uniform and carried the revolver in an inside pocket of the blouse. In some manner it was discharged, the bullet entering the side about an inch below the heart. The body is at the public morgue. Chief of Police Clark stated that a

FOUR MILES OF STREET UNDER PAVING PLANS

BIDS WILL BE LET AT WALLA WALLA TOTALING \$150,000 FOR IMPROVEMENT

WALLA WALLA, Wash., Jan. 26.—If paving as planned by the city commissioners is laid this summer, Walla Walla will have surface over four miles of streets. The board adopted resolutions declaring its intention to pave 70 blocks of streets and fixed Tuesday, February 15, as the date for hearing objections of property owners.

If all the streets proposed are paved it will mean contracts in the neighborhood of \$150,000.

Muffins

When muffins are on the breakfast table, nobody cares for meat or eggs and they would be served so hurriedly that there is no time to make them. If K. C. the double-raise baking powder is used, the batter may be stirred up the night before, put in the pan ready for baking and nothing to do in the morning but bake them.

One-Egg Muffins

2 cups flour; 2 slightly rounded teaspoonsful K. C. Baking Powder; 1 teaspoonful salt; 4 egg sugar; 1 cup melted butter or lard; 1 egg; 1 cup water or milk.

Sift dry ingredients together three times. Add to this the unbeaten egg, mixed thoroughly and water or milk. Then beat all together until perfectly smooth. Oil muffin or gem pans and have even slow until the muffins come to the top of the pan, then increase the heat to bake and brown the muffins. This recipe makes 12 large muffins. Raisins or currants may be added if desired.

Graham Muffins

1 cup graham flour; 1 cup pastry flour; 2 level teaspoonsful K. C.
