BIG MUNITION PLANT WOULD BE NEEDED TO SUPPLY MILLION MEN

FORCE OF 750,000 WORKMEN ESSENTIAL WITH SUCH AN ARMY IN FIELD.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 27.—Estimates were given the senate military committee by Brigadier-General Crozier, chief of ordnance, showing that a plant costing \$100,000,000, operated by a force of 750,000 workmen, would be required to manufacture ammunition and war materials necessary to keep an army of a million men in the field and equip an additional million recruits.

General Crozier strongly disapproved any approval for government monopoly of the manufacture of war supplies, insisting that best results could be accomplished by relying on private establishments to supplement the output of government plants in time of war.

Continental Army Tentative. The committee received from Secretary Garrison a draft of a tentative measure suggested by Senator Chamberlain, chairman of the committee, which would provide for the authorization in general terms only, leaving the details of the proposed system to be worked out by war department regulations. The original draft of a bill submitted by the war department contained an outline of the entire system.

Mr. Garrison pointed out to the congressional committee, when he appeared before them, however, that as the plan largely was an experimental one, it would be wise to give the president wide discretionary powers to meet problems which only could be solved in the light of experience yet to be gained.

WILSON GETS TOYS' GIFTS.

Simple Presents From Little Belgians Affect President.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 26.—P. H. Chadburn, representing the Belgian Relief commission, brought to the White House a trunk full of simple presents sent to the President and Mrs. Wilson by Belgian children.

They included dolls, pictures, busts of the royal family and embroidery work. The president read accompanying messages and said he was deeply affected by the sentiments.

Coasting Boy Breaks Hip.

ST. JOHNS, Jan. 26.—Gary Smith, halfback last year on the football team of James John High School, in St. Johns, sustained a fracture of the hip while coasting on Burlington Hill. He slid crashed into a cement post at the foot of the hill.

Prize Court Reported Swamped.

BERLIN, Jan. 28.—(By wireless to Saxville, N. Y.)—Reports from Dutch sources say that the number of undecided cases now before the British prize courts is so great that if peace were concluded at the present time the courts would be occupied for two years.

COYOTE FUND HELD UP

REPRESENTATIVE FITZ GERALD OF NEW YORK PREVENTS APPROPRIATION.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 28.—Objection raised by Representative Fitz Gerald, of New York, defeated an Amendment offered to the deficiency appropriation bill by Representative Howell, of Utah, providing an appropriation of \$75,000 to enable the department of agriculture to cooperate with the states in exterminating coyotes, wolves and other predatory animals afflicted with rabies.

The appropriation may be secured in the senate, where it would not be subject to a point of order, in which event the house probably will concur in the senate amendment.

Representative Howell read to the house a letter from the secretary of agriculture in which he explained fully the menace to the west of wild animals which are spreading rabies among domestic and range animals.

Mr. Fitz Gerald, however, contended that the secretary should have submitted a formal recommendation to congress. Mr. Fitz Gerald admitted the need for the appropriation and said something should be done to eradicate the evil, but he would not permit the appropriation to be made until it is regularly recommended by the secretary of agriculture.

Shabbiness Hides \$13,461.

CHICAGO, Jan. 28.—A little gray-haired woman, in whose shabby clothes the authorities found \$13,461 in bonds and currency is being held at the psychopathic hospital while efforts to discover her identity are being made.

The bonds, valued at \$10,000, are obligations of a San Francisco building and loan association.

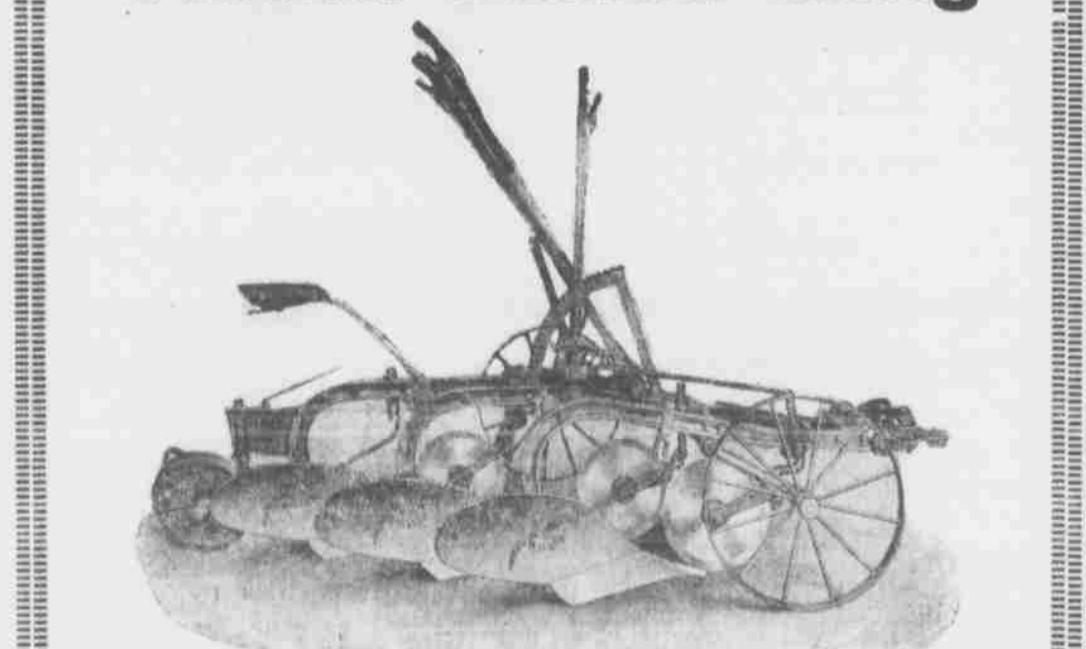


MISS IDA FINGERHUT.
