ACRES WILL BE TURNED INTO BIRD SANCTUARY

(By United Press.)

GREENWICH, Conn., Jan. 29.—C. C. Converse, multi-millionaire, is turning his 1500 acres here into a bird sanctuary to aid the national movement for the conservation of bird life. Mr. Converse and George A. Drew, manager of the big estate, Converse Manor, are enthusiastic over the plan. An ornithologist of high ability will be selected from the Massachusetts agricultural college and will be ordered to make Converse Manor an ideal bird refuge. His work will include the raising of wild ducks and the winter feeding and protection of insectivorous birds, this including the setting out of nesting boxes and lessening the enemies of bird life. A bird census will be taken at the start and comparisons made as the work progresses. Special attention will be given to the increase of insect eating birds.

ARMENIANS NEED HELP.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 29.—Another appeal for help for starving Armenians reached the state department through the American embassy at London. Ambassador Page cabled that Viscount Bryce had represented to him that he had information from Armenian ecclesiastical officers that large numbers of Armenian exiles who had been driven out of their own country by the Turks now are helpless in the deserts of Syria and Mesopotamia.

The viscount asked that the state department be requested to do what it can for their relief.

RED BOY MINE IS SOLD.

Property in Grant County bid in at Sheriff's Sale for \$34,500.

BAKER, Ore., Jan. 27.—H. A. Sonne, cashier of the Baker Loan & Trust company, announced upon his return from Canyon City that he had bid in for \$34,500 the property of the Red Boy Mines company at a sheriff's sale for the bank, holder of a trust mortgage securing a \$137,998 bond issue. The sale was effected by cancelling a large part of the bond issue, at considerable below par.

Judgment given by the Grant county circuit court, on which the sale was based, was \$171,835.98, together with \$5000 attorney's fees, to be divided between Clifford & Correll, of Baker, and William Jackson, of Chicago, \$22 costs and \$500 for trustees' fees.

It is understood that steps may be taken within a short time to place the mine once more in the producing class.

The Red Boy has a past record as a profitable venture, but for the last five years the property has been idle.

Rabies at Bly to Be Investigated.

KLAMATH FALLS, Ore., Jan. 27.—With a view of making a survey of the rabies situation in the Bly section in Eastern Klamath county, Field Agent Averill, of the United States Biological survey, has passed through this city en route to Bly, where he will make personal investigations.
