ECLIPSE OF FEBRUARY 3 VISIBLE IN OREGON

ONE TENTH OF SUN'S SURFACE WILL BE OBTAINED IN NORTHWEST. UNIVERSITY OF OREGON, Eugene, Jan. 29.—For the first time in many years, a solar eclipse visible in the northwest will occur on February 3, 1916. The following information regarding it has been prepared by Edward H. McAllister, professor of mechanics and astronomy at the University of Oregon. The eclipse will be total within a narrow belt, varying from 30 to 20 miles in width, lying mainly in the Pacific and Atlantic oceans. This belt is called the "path of total eclipse." It begins in the Pacific ocean some 45 degrees of longitude west of the Peninsula of Panama, traverses the Pacific to the west coast of Colombia, crosses Colombia and the northern part of Venezuela, thence pursues a general northwesterly course extending nearly but not quite to the British Isles. Oregon is situated far from the path of total eclipse but for all points in Oregon the sun will rise partially eclipsed. Imagine a line beginning on the north boundary of the state at the point where the Columbia river first touches it (longitude 119 degrees west of Greenwich), and extending thence to the southern boundary of the state at the point where the common boundary between the Oregon territory and Nevada touches the Oregon boundary (longitude 120 degrees), then for all points on that line the "middle of eclipse" or moment of greatest obscuration points in the state east of that line will occur precisely at sunrise, for all the middle of eclipse will occur shortly after sunrise, and more than half of the eclipse will be visible for all points in the state west of that line, the middle of eclipse will have passed before sunrise, and less than half the eclipse will be visible. The greatest degree of obscuration visible in different parts of the state varies in a complicated manner, but in a general way it may be said that in the extreme northwestern part of the state only about one-tenth of the sun's diameter will appear obscured, while in the extreme southeastern part nearly one-fourth of the diameter will be obscured; at other points within the state the amount of obscuration will fall within these limits. The time of sunrise on the date of eclipse has been computed for each of eight widely distributed points in Oregon, widely distributed over the state so that the time in other localities can be inferred within a minute or so. The times have all been reduced to Pacific Standard time. In particular localities the time of ap-

SUNDAY CLOSING LAW FOUGHT AT LA GRANDE

LA GRANDE, Jan. 31.—There is a big legal fight on in the circuit court here before Judge J. W. Knowles for the purpose of restraining and prosecuting attorneys and sheriff from enforcing the Sunday closing law. Late Saturday night a complaint was filed entitled "J. Van Huren and George Young versus Colonel E. Eberhard, district and county attorney, and August Huerk, sheriff." Complaint seeks to enjoin the enforcement of the law on the grounds that it is unconstitutional and that it violates privileges and immunities of citizens, etc. Attorneys for plaintiff at a hearing tried to make their point that the court should define what "all circumstances of necessity" meant as a matter of law. Plaintiffs were represented by F. S. Ivanhoe and T. H. Crawford. The state was represented by Colonel Eberhard, district attorney, and the court appointed E. W. Eastman, on his application, amicus curiae. This case was tried out at 10 o'clock this morning and taken under advisement, after two hours argument by the attorneys.
