WRITES WISCONSIN GAME COMMISSION OFFERING TO PAY FOR VIOLATIONS.

MADISON, Wis., Feb. 1.—Fear that he will have to answer on the judgment day for breaking the game laws of Wisconsin caused a former citizen of this state, now living at Dallas, Ore., to write and ask the state conservation commission to forgive him and allow him to make restitution. He wrote that he had killed game in Clarke county, southeast of Neillville, about three years ago. The commission told him to make

Statistics Show Pendleton Health Record Excellent

COMPARISON INDICATES THIS CITY AS HEALTHFUL AS ANY IN COUNTRY

Judging from comparative death rates, Pendleton is just about as healthful a place to live as any city on the map of America. Pendleton's death rate for the year 1915 was approximately 10.4 for every 1000 population, there having been 86 deaths in the city, exclusive of still births and premature births which aren't included in government statistics. This rate is higher than the normal year.

Director S. L. Rogers of the U. S. bureau of census, has just sent out statements of the mortality in cities under 100,000 inhabitants. He states that the rates are more or less crude inasmuch as they make no allowance for the difference in the sex and age distribution of the population and are based upon populations estimated. The following shows the death rate of Pendleton for 1915 as compared with the 1915 death rate in various cities over the country: Pendleton, 10.4; Mobile, Ala., 21.8; San Diego, 19.3; Colorado Springs, 14.7; Hartford, Conn., 17.5; Wilmington, Del., 15.9; Jacksonville, Fla., 15.6; Savannah, Ga., 25.4; Springfield, Ill., 15.4; Fort Wayne, Ind., 11.6; Kansas City, Kan., 12.1; Owensboro, Ky., 19.4; Portland, Me., 16.6; Cumberland, Md., 17.1; Springfield, Mass., 15.2; Saginaw, Mich., 13; Duluth, Minn., 11.7; Springfield, Mo., 16.3; Butte, Mont., 17.2; Lincoln, Neb., 12.1; Dover, N. H., 19.2; Atlantic City, N. J., 15.4; Schenectady, N. Y., 11.4; Wilmington, N. C., 23.5; Akron, O., 13.5; Erie, Penn., 14.6; Woonsocket, R. I., 13.6; Charleston, S. C., 27.5; Chattanooga, Tenn., 18.4; El Paso, Tex., 30.4; Salt Lake City, 19.3; Burlington, Ver., 20.4; Norfolk, Va., 19.6; North Yakima, 9; Wheeling, W. Va., 16; Racine, Wis., 11.8.

These cities have been picked at random, one from each state registered, and no attempt has been made to secure cities with high rates. Very few indeed are those whose death rate is given lower than Pendleton's and most of those are marked to indicate that the registration is incomplete or the population overestimated.

Clean the Snow Off Your Walks.

Section 4, Ordinance No. 236, of the City of Pendleton, reads as follows: "Sec. 4. That all persons occupying property on any and all streets within the corporate limits where sidewalks are laid shall and they are hereby required to keep the same clear from snow and ice. Provided that in case of vacant lots the owner shall only be required to cause the sidewalk in front of the same to be cleaned as heretofore provided. The penalty for not complying with this section is a fine of not less than \$5 or more than \$50. All persons are notified to comply with the above section immediately under penalty of arrest and fine. T. B. GURDANE, Chief of Police of City of Pendleton, (Adv.)"
