JAPAN IS PROFITING ALSO FROM THE WAR RAGING IN EUROPE

UNDREAMED OF PROSPERITY COMES AND MANY ARE NEW-MADE MILLIONAIRES.

Leading Shipyards Have Filed Orders Which Will Keep Them Busy for Three Years—Predictions Made Japan Will Have Mercantile Marine Second Only to England.

(By United Press.) TOKYO, Feb. 3.—The European war has brought undreamed of prosperity to Japan. Evidence of this is found not only in the enormous increase in the gold reserve, but in the fact that the Japanese newspapers are busy chronicling the rise of many new-made millionaires, who plunged early in the war and emerged with riches. The leading shipyards of Japan have filed orders which will keep them busy for three years. Thanks to the withdrawal of German vessels, Japanese shipping is enjoying the greatest prosperity in its history. Shipping men are predicting that Japan will in a few years have a merchant marine second only to that of England. They believe, too, that ship building is destined to become a great national industry in Japan. A Japanese named Nobuyo Uchida, who at the outbreak of the war was a clerk, saw that a naval war meant a golden harvest for shipping. He left his desk and launched a shipping business, chartering small vessels. Now he owns four steamers and has cleared more than \$1,000,000. In Tokyo the Yamashita Shipping company, controlled by a business man of that name, has netted \$2,500,000. Japan's gold reserve has increased by \$100,000,000. She now has in reserve \$250,000,000.

With Change Ship Schedules PORTLAND, Ore., Feb. 3.—Effective February 8th, steam Northern Pacific of the Great Northern Pacific Steamship company, now sailing between San Francisco and Astoria, will be removed from coastwise service and placed in service between San Francisco and Honolulu via San Pedro. On February 16th, the ocean greyhound leaves San Francisco for a de luxe cruise of the Pacific to Honolulu and the Mid-Pacific Carnival, February 21 to 26, returning to San Francisco March 4.

Banker Advises Housewives. CLEVELAND, O., Feb. 3.—If every family saved one match a day, the United States would be ahead \$200,000 a year, said F. D. Conner, president of one of the biggest financial institutions here. Conner believes every housewife should be paid a weekly wage to prevent family squabbles, and that every wife should prevent food waste. He claims fortunes in food are thrown into the garbage cans. The banker believes bills should be paid by check and a stipulated amount saved weekly.

ITALIAN DIPLOMATS SAY GERMANY SEEKS TO INFLUENCE POPE

TEUTONIC LEADERS TRYING TO MAKE TROUBLE THROUGH THE VATICAN.

Charge Is Made That Internal Strife Is Being Stirred Up in Order to Engineer Plan for Making Guarantee of Protection of Vatican an International Affair.

BY ALICE ROHE (United Press Staff Correspondent.) ROME, Jan. 7.—(By mail)—Italian diplomats believe Germany is trying to make internal trouble for Italy through the Vatican. The Vatican is the seat of government of the Catholic church, much as the District of Columbia is the seat of government of the United States. The Vatican, however, is classed as exclusively a seat of spiritual government, and is supposed to have nothing to do with the temporal government of Italy or any other country. Prior to 1870 the Catholic church governed both spiritually and in many places. When the temporal power of the church was taken away in 1871, Italy established the Law of Guarantee whereby the Vatican is guaranteed absolute protection by Italy, from interference from any source with its affairs as a spiritual governing agency. So long as Italy guarantees protection to the Vatican, Italy retains absolute control of all her territory. However, should other nations step in and say that inasmuch as the Catholic church has ramifications throughout the world, they feel that all the nations should jointly guarantee protection to the Vatican. Italy would then be in a peculiar position. It is the fear that Germany is trying to engineer such an internationalizing of the Law of Guarantee, that is worrying Italian diplomats at present. As Italy views it, the danger of internationalizing the Vatican's guarantee of protection lies in this hypothetical case: suppose the Vatican should attempt to interfere with temporal government in Italy and Italy fought the attempt as it fought the temporal power of the church prior to 1870. Suppose also that there were an international law of guarantee. Then suppose Germany was interested in making all the trouble for Italy that it possibly could. All Germany would have to do would be to step in and say to Italy: "Here! We guarantee non-interference with the Vatican and we want you to let the Vatican alone." Any other nation, which might be a party to the guarantee and which had a grudge against Italy could do the same thing. But so long as Italy alone guarantees non-interference with the Vatican, it controls the situation. This question had lain dormant for many years until the present war aroused it. The first public recognition Italy made that the question was again stirred up was the recent speech by Minister Orlando at Palermo, in which he reiterated and emphasized the fact that Italy and Italy alone will protect the Vatican. Many Americans wrongly interpreted that speech as indicating that Italy would countenance the re-establishing of the temporal power of the church in Italy.

ENGLISH DISAPPOINTED AT WILSON'S SPEECH

LONDON, Feb. 3.—The Daily News in an editorial expresses disappointment at President Wilson's speech, which it takes weakens the impression created by his address to the Railway Business association.

"His phrase 'friction is likely to arise regarding the movement of overseas commerce,'" says the Daily News, "manifestly suggests that the disputes between Great Britain and the United States are so grave as to justify an armament campaign." But this is surely incredible.

President Wilson's "warlike" speech at New York and Secretary Lansing's proposal for the disarmament of belligerent merchantmen, continue to attract attention from the editorial writers here.

"The Globe said that the allies might consent to disarm their merchant ships if the United States promised to consider a breach of Germany's part of the bargain—to refrain from torpedoing merchantmen without warning—a cause for war.

The evening Star questioned whether President Wilson was warning

England or Germany, when he told a New York audience that he did not know what America's international position might be tomorrow.

Jews Desire Palestine. (By United Press.)

CHICAGO, Feb. 3.—A thousand delegates from Jewish organizations throughout America gathered in Chicago to promote the Jewish plans for the development of Palestine and particularly, Jerusalem. They come to plan for an international congress of their race, which is expected to plan the restoration of Palestine to the Jews. Hundreds of thousands of dollars already have been pledged toward this and much already has been accomplished. Louis D. Brandeis, Boston lawyer, who has been prominent among the Zionists, declared that the American Congress of Jews is not indulging in an idle dream. "It is more than a possibility," he said.

Relative of Garibaldi Wounded. ROME, Feb. 3.—Captain Elio Garibaldi, relative of the famous Garibaldi, was operated upon and his condition is serious. Garibaldi was wounded in the neck in recent fighting.

Persians and Turks Join

BERLIN, Feb. 3.—The Russian newspaper Hirabestia Vedomosti published reports from Teheran saying the situation of the Russians in Persia is becoming worse, says the Overseas News Agency.

Tribesmen Capture English

LONDON, Jan. 25.—Serous tribesmen in northwestern Egypt have captured 94 survivors of his master's sunken ship Tara. It was announced.

A considerable amount of the land within national forest boundaries is in private ownership, title having passed from the United States largely through the timber and stone, and the homestead laws prior to the creation of the forests. During the past fiscal year 331 individual tracts of land within the boundaries of the national forests passed into private ownership through the patenting of claims. Of these, 269 were homesteads, 3 timber and stone, 59 mineral, 17 coal and 1 miscellaneous.

December Exports Enormous

WASHINGTON, Feb. 3.—American exports for December exceed those for any previous month in the country's history, according to figures just made public by the bureau of foreign and domestic commerce. The total value of the goods shipped abroad for the month is placed at \$359,301,274, which brings the total exports for 1915 to \$3,550,915,393, or about a billion dollars more than was ever before exported during a like period.

The excess of exports over imports for 1915 was \$1,772,369,528, which is a striking increase over the average of about \$450,000,000 for a number of years before the war started. The excess of exports over imports for December alone was \$187,459,609, an increase of about \$17,000,000 over December of the previous year.

The import trade continued to gain during December and the total of \$171,841,665 was larger than for any other month of the year, and is an increase of \$57,185,126 over the total imports for December, 1914. It is only \$12,188,906 short of the total for December, 1913, which was the largest in the history of our import trade. The total value of articles imported during the calendar year 1915 is placed at \$1,778,605,855, which is the lowest figure for a number of years. In 1914 the imports were placed at \$1,789,276,901; in 1913, at \$1,792,596,480; and for 1912, at \$1,819,073,905. Duty free imports comprised 71.7 per cent of the December, 1915 imports.

Gold imports in December last were valued at \$45,412,677, as compared with \$4,109,063 in December, 1914. The year's gold imports aggregated \$451,954,590, as against \$57,387,741 for 1914. Gold exports totaled \$11,889,285 for December and \$21,425,918 for the year ending with December, 1915. The net inward movement of gold for 1915 was \$420,528,673, compared with a net outward movement of \$165,228,415 in 1914.
